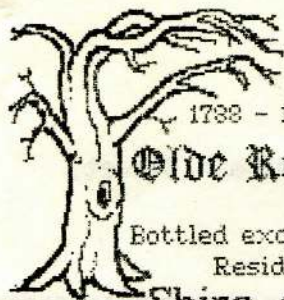

COUNCIL NEWS

- * Planning permits have been granted for a 6 block sub-division on the east side of Rogers Street, between Palmer and Murphy Streets (old Butter Factory site), and our new "Romsey Heights" Estate which is the vacant land on the north-west of the township as mentioned last month. This permit is to be issued after minor changes to submitted plans.
 - * Council has struck a rate which actually is 6.94% increase on last year. The water Board increase is 3%.
 - * The Recreation Centre will get improvements to the value of \$90,000+.
 - * The Australia Day parade will be held at Lancefield on Tuesday 26th January, 1988 on the last evening of the 4 day weekend. The official Boxing Day Holiday will be 25th January. High Street will be closed between Main Road and Duglan Street from mid-afternoon to approximately 10 p.m.
 - * It is hoped that an Adult Immunization Session will be conducted late November, early December. Things like mumps, measles, tetanus, rubella sabin etc. will hopefully be available, DON'T MISS OUT. More later.
 - * Council has commenced its Home Maintenance Scheme. Basically, the scheme is intended for the elderly and disabled, to assist them with the everyday minor maintenance items that make the house safer etc. and small modifications to make it easier for disabled persons to manage. Assistance in organizing larger jobs is also given. Contact Robert MCINTYRE at the Shire Office (29 5201). We have again applied for funding for a disabled toilet at the rear of the Mechanics Institute.
 - * Finally, the Shire Office will close from 5 p.m. on Thursday 24th December until 9 a.m. 4th January, 1988. Emergency contact numbers will be advertised.

Understanding Plant Names Part 3. Horticulturally speaking, two of the most widely misused terms in describing garden plants by gardening writers as well as the general public are "kind" and "variety". While these terms are often regarded as synonyms in other contexts, it is generally accepted in horticulture that the term "kind" implies a degree of difference between plants greater than that implied by the term "variety"; a distinction comparable with the terms "genus" and "species" in botany or zoology. Hence one would refer to apples, pears, plums, apricots etc. as "kinds" of fruit and Jonathan, Delicious, Packham's Triumph, Satsuma, Moorpark etc. as "varieties" although in recent years the term "cultivar" has come into favor by many writers to distinguish the "variety" originating in cultivation from the variants which may be included within a botanical species.

The term "species" which is both singular and plural - there is no such word as "specie" - is another frequently misused and misspelt word among gardening writers. While the difference between plants and some animals considered sufficient to classify them as separate species is often the subject of debate among biologists, the use of the term to distinguish plants of garden origin (cultivars) from one another is not appropriate, although one may refer to them as being varieties or cultivars of the species from which they originated, except in the case of hybrids between different species where the term may be more or less irrelevant.

The regrettable practice of copyrighting cultivar names or using copyright names as cultivar names, e.g. "Nelly Kelly" for a passionfruit plant produced by a certain nursery, will unfortunately, lead to a multiplicity of names for the same plant as time passes, resulting in more confusion.

RANDOM RAGGINGS by "Rambler"

DOGS - Man's Best Friend?"

This writer confesses to not being a very "doggie" person. But, having said that, will admit that many people do find great love and comfort, even help in need, from dogs.

However, I am greatly concerned by certain events involving dogs. The recent news in the daily press that more than 80 children have been admitted to the Royal Childrens Hospital so far this year because of dog attacks appals me. Even allowing that some of those children may have mis-handled the animals concerned the figure is unacceptably high.

In Romsey one woman has had to make six visits to her doctor over the past two months, and still has an unpleasant sore on her leg due to an unprovoked dog attack while walking along a road. I know of a family of five who do a fair amount of cycling. All have been bitten during the year, some more than once. And several people have told me that our "postie" has had a number of unpleasant encounters with dogs.

It is not good enough!

True, people should be able to keep dogs as pets, to show, or to guard their homes. But, their dogs should be properly looked after and controlled, or contained. I confess my ignorance as to what Council by-laws apply in this situation. However, I suggest that the following requirements would be the minimum standard required:-

1. People with legitimate reasons for coming to a front door should be able to do so without having to "run the gauntlet" - at least during daylight hours;
2. People with legitimate reasons for approaching letter boxes and newspaper containers should be able to do so without being bitten, or feeling that they may be;
3. Dogs should not be allowed to roam unattended where there is no front fence;
4. Homes with no front fence should have fully enclosed back yards if there are dogs on the property;
5. Gates should be closed, and secure, when dogs are loose.

There are other issues too, such as domestic dogs which are not responsibly restrained attacking sheep. However, it is the possibility of human injury that most concerns me. Particularly little children who can be scarred physically and mentally, even killed, by dogs which are not properly controlled by irresponsible owners.

The Shire Ranger is usually very helpful in these matters. He should be contacted if you have any problems with, or about, dogs - especially if the owners are unsympathetic to your requests for consideration.

REPORT ON PUBLIC MEETING HELD TO DISCUSS THE OPTIONS FOR A NEW POST PRIMARY SCHOOL AND A NEW PRIMARY SCHOOL IN ROMSEY: Thirty Six people attended the Public Meeting held at the school on Friday 30th October. After viewing slides depicting the growth of Romsey over the past 10 years, speakers outlined the various options available for the re-building/re-siting of the Romsey Primary School. Mr. Peter Skilbeck of Castlemaine Regional Office explained the Cobaw Area School Study which showed a growth of 32% in the Romsey Shire. He outlined the options available which included -

1. Development of a Prep-Year 10 Complex;
2. Development of Primary School/Post Primary School on separate sites;
3. Re-development of Primary School on existing site /Secondary School on separate site;
4. Post Primary School at Lancefield or Riddells Creek.

People at the meeting were requested to vote on the 4 options. 16 selected - Option 2.; 15 selected - Option 1, however 5 of these had the proviso that the Primary School be separate from the Secondary School eg. adjoining sites; 3 selected - Option 3.

Many people at the meeting felt that primary school children had separate needs from secondary school children and would develop better in their own environment than in a shared environment.
