HARATSI'S REPORT

The Romsey Ratepayers Association fully supports council's efforts to communicate the findings of the Haratsis report to the residents and ratepayers of the Shire, and to invite comment prior to a final decision being taken.

Disappointingly, few residents have requested copies of the summary of the report, which is available at no cost from the Shire Office. Other than those sent to people who made submissions to the consultants, less than one hundred have been issued on request.

This Association has arranged to get several hundred copies from Council and to distribute them to residents. This commenced last Saturday in Romsey Shopping Centre.

Council intends to make a decision on which option for growth to adopt on 27th June.

While this Association certainly does not wish to draw proceedings out unnecessarily, it seems that such an important decision, which will effectively shape the future development of the Shire, should not be rushed into without more information and more consideration.

It may be desirable to defer the decision until after the next council.

Elections in August. In the meantime, more information could be made available and the candidates could stand on the basis of their support for one or other option.

Perhaps this decision is so important that a "Referendum" should be held in conjunction with that election.

The report puts two options for development, but the information provided is not specific enough to enable a once-for-all decision to be made. Because this decision will have an impact well beyond the year 2000, there needs to be involvement of more people than just the twelve councillors.

At present there is no indication as to where the sub-divisions are going to be or how the rate of growth is to be controlled, especially in the sensitive rural areas where a new style of sub-division needs to be carefully introduced. It should be remembered that the majority of people surveyed did not favour continued uncontrolled sub-division. The future needs to be spelled out.

This association does not see its role as being to recommend one or other option; that is for each individual to decide. It firmly believes, however, that mechanisms for ongoing consultation with community representatives need to be put in place, to monitor the rate and direction of future development.

THE ROMSEY RAMBLER:

It is good to see the elements of traditional design (red brick with cream trim) emerging on Habib's new Romsey Supermarket. That is the sort of thing that the 'Keep Romsey Rural' campaign, and this column, have been advocating for some time now. This style of architecture will preserve our streetscape. Yet it will allow enough variety of design to ensure that everything is not boring in its same-ness.

Our older buildings, the newly refurbished hotel, the new medical centre and bank corner - all blend well enough to maintain the right image. The contemporary (some might just say temporary) 'Miami Vice' architectural style so current today is fine elsewhere but not in our main street. Thank goodness our other supermarket complex is set back as it is. No doubt ~~those new shops~~ will provide a present and future asset to our community. But their appearance is rescued only by the retention of the old shop fronts on the street and the matching style of the new shop alongside them.

Shire Councillors and Staff are to be encouraged to insist on all new developments in the most visible parts of Romsey blending into the traditional patterns.

Sad to see that certain celebrations recently got out of hand, causing damage to neighbouring property and requiring police attendance. This prompts the questions; where are the parents?, or, what sort of guidance are they providing?

It is a cliché, but nonetheless true, to suggest that delinquent behaviour in the young reflects delinquent parenting. No doubt these are hard times for many people. No doubt many families do need to have both parents in full-time employment to meet house payments, the interest burden, food bills, etc. BUT, and it is a BIG BUT, there is no excuse for not providing the love, the support AND THE DISCIPLINE that makes for healthy community standards. So, parents it is up to you. You have the greatest influence and control on the lives and development of your children.

For their sakes, for your own sakes, for the sake of the community
- please give your young people the best example, the best guidance, the best chance - before it is too late!!

COUNCIL NEWS

As a result of an appeal, Council has issued a permit for an up-right gas tank at the service station by Gordon Cres. Council has adopted a policy that future applications for flat and/or multi-unit housing be prohibited within the Shire pending a flat code and suitable amendments to the planning scheme currently being undertaken by our planning consultants. It is a temporary ban and does not effect "granny flat" applications. In that light, an application for four brick vincer dwellings in Station Street was refused. An application for a child care centre at Metcalfe/Barry Str., has been deferred pending further consultation with the applicant regarding the possibility of relocating the development to an alternative site. Applications for a B.Y.O. permit at Perfect Grounds Cafe and use of Romsey House for the display, sale and service of light machinery, were granted.

The success of the After School Hours Programme is such that Council will be advertising for a third person to assist in its running. We would like to remind you of the altered V Line bus service. Please remember, it is for a trial period and your patronage will ensure it remains and, where necessary, improve. Council is calling tenders to complete the footpath between Kathryn Cres, and White Avenue. With good fortune, the path may be completed prior to winter truly setting in.

Finally, tenders for the Kinder/I.W.C. complex close on 20/6/90. Shortly after a successful tenderer will be announced and construction will begin. Quite a few mothers in the Shire will, no doubt, be keenly interested in its progress during the construction stage.

IN YOUR ROMSEY GARDEN No.52

Garden Fertilizers Pt.1 In the Aug.3 1988 edition of The Weekly Times, Karen Cooper reports on a warning given to delegates at the Grassland Society of Victoria by Dr. Doug Edmeades of New Zealand, concerning worldwide trials of a well-known product which provided no evidence of any benefit whatever to the consumer in terms of improved growth of plants or grazing animals. In a defamation suit lasting 137 days, the cost to the manufacturer was \$2.25M and the Ministry of Agriculture about \$1M.

Although it is a known fact that some plants such as lawn grasses, citrus fruit, passion-fruit and vegetables grown for their leaves require much more nitrogen fertilizer than most other plants and that deficiencies of some trace elements such as molybdenum occur in cauliflowers and broccoli and boron, iron, manganese etc, in fruit trees, and that the use of some alkaline fertilizers can be detrimental to Camellias, Rhododendrons and other plants which thrive in acid soils, the needs of most plants in the home garden can be adequately met at reduced cost by the purchase of 50kg. bags of mixed fertilizer containing the three major elements nitrogen, phosphorus and potash (NPK) supplemented where necessary by other ingredients such as trace elements or by extra amounts of nitrogen etc. Blood & Bone, a slow acting nitrogen fertilizer containing little of value beyond about 7% N is not cheap and does not provide an adequate diet for most plants.
