Lancefield Community Bank Branch of Bendigo Bank

Steering Committee set up for Romsey Branch:
A nine-member Romsey Steering Committee has been set up to spearhead the push for a Bendigo Bank Community Bank branch in the town. The Steering Committee is chaired by local solicitor Maureen Wiltshire, a Board member of the community-owned company which already runs the Lancefield Community Branch of Bendigo Bank.

The Steering Committee has been established to work towards a Romsey branch in conjunction with the community-owned company, Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd.

The other members of the Romsey Steering Committee are retired school principal Trevor Turnham, barristers' clerk Ric Howells, earthmoving contractor Doug Newnham, butcher Peter O'Rourke, estate agent John Woodham, management consultant and vigneron Bruce Knight, Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services chair John Chisholm and Board member Graeme Walker.

"We held our public meeting on June 27 to explain in detail to the community the steps needed to realise the aim of establishing a community-owned and operated Bank that meets our needs and is here for the long haul," Mrs Wiltshire said.

"People now realise that a secure banking future is in our own hands. If we can demonstrate as a community that we want a bank and we can make it a viable one, Bendigo Bank and Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services will reciprocate.

"Bendigo Bank's excellent Community Bank concept also provides a profit-sharing arrangement, whereby a proportion of profits are channelled back into projects of local community benefit."

Mrs Wiltshire said residents needed to submit pledge forms to indicate the amount of share capital they were prepared to contribute to the establishment of the Bank – which would also give them ownership and a say in their banking future.

Pledge forms can be left in the secure boxes located at butcher Peter O'Rourke's shop, the Romsey IGA supermarket, the newsagency and the Lancefield Bank branch at 20B High St.

Pledge details are confidential, and are only known to Mr Tumham as he collates the total.

To have towns such as Gisborne, Woodend, Romsey and Lancefield "cooking with gas" through the extension of the natural gas pipeline continues to be a priority for myself and the Bracks Government.

Mains gas will bring lifestyle benefits for our region by cutting heating and cooking costs. It will also drive economic development and jobs growth and help the environment by producing less greenhouse gases than alternative energy sources.

Since coming to office, I have worked with the Macedon Ranges Shire and Natural Gas Working Party, Department of Infrastructure and TXU to develop mains gas options for our region. I have also held discussions with the Premier and the Treasurer who are acutely aware of the disadvantage facing areas without a mains gas supply.

The Bracks Government is actively examining the feasibility of extending the gas network in rural and regional areas. The high infrastructure cost remair major hurdle to be overcome. The cost of the network needs to be weighed apagainst the cost savings that will be achieved through the use of mains gas versus alternative energy sources.


When the previous Government privatised the state's energy assets (gas and electricity) there were no provisions for any extensions to the gas pipeline, and in fact several disincentives for that extension to take place. The Bracks Government is committed to trying to overcome these hurdles.

We have already legislated to allow a gas distributor and retailer who extends the network to have an exclusive franchise of up to 10 years and 5 years respectively over the new infrastructure.

This will provide greater certainty to investors and improve the commercial opportunities from any extensions.



What's next along Five Mile Creek?

The working bee on Sunday June 21st cleared the end of Wrixon Street and under the huge fir trees. The clean-up has come to open ground – buttercup and overgrown mint with only the occasional willow roots choking the creek. Peter Mitchell a local historian gave us the real story about the bathing boxes and the pool, the original homesteads along the creek, and the local opinion of the Kelly gang who were known to come to the races up this way. Did you know Romsey had its own swimming coach? There is a book coming out soon, if you missed this day.

So where do we go from here?

- ◆ Tree-planting on Sunday July 28th (National Tree Day). We'll plant trees in the first section of the creek, to replace some of the willows eventually. Council will provide the trees Ring up if you want to come, or just roll up about 11am.
- ♦ Finding the track. More Sherlock Holmes investigators are welcome as we mark out the walking track for winter. Bring a sharp spade or cutting blade to find the edge of the gravel, so we can kill the grass growing over the track. Ring Jay on 5429 6163.
- Flowers ... should we have some bulbs growing along the creek? If you have an opinion, ring up.
- Dirt bike jumps. Don't be surprised to see the earth move, as the dirt bike guys begin to construct a track near Couzens Lane. Council have approved a site and a plan.
- ♦ Bridges. Crossings at Pohlman Street and Wrixon Street both need bridges. This is still very much on our agenda.
- ♦ YOU ARE NEEDED. If you haven't come down yet, but thought about it, please put it in your diary. Don't leave it to someone else. Get a friend to come, or ring up so you'll know someone. It's a great feeling to see the water flow when you've cleared a patch.

ws from the Mt William ommunity Reference Group

A varied group of people came to the Community Reference Group meeting on Monday June 17 in Lancefield. They had many things in common including a love of the area and wanting ti to stay rural while providing for people's needs. They all saw value in working together to get things done, and to solve local problems. Interests ranged from children's facilities such as playgroup and the dropin centre, junior football club, the skate park, local park facilities in general, to the quest to get a library, improving some local roads, energy, environment, employment and a sustainable future. All were interested in trying to find a balance between maintaining the Shire's country feeling while managing the increasing

pulation and improving facilities. nowing Who's Who and What's On in town... or how do you find things out?

I listened with interest to some discussion about the way community groups work in our towns. The experience of 'old timers' in the area, seems to be very different to that of newcomers. It's the old story, what counts is inside knowledge. So some people experience frustration trying to find out how things work and how to get access to facilities, or information. It can also be difficult for new people to get onto committees. When you're in a group, it's always hard to imagine how it is for others. Some would like to see groups being more open to newcomers. How can that be achieved? Our two papers, the Lancefield Mercury

1 the Romsev Rag already do aahty job. How could we use them even better? One suggestion was to send your requests for local information to the Mercury or the Rag so that community members could answer in the next edition and everybody would learn. There was an interesting discussion around the differences between the Lancefield and Romsev communities and the connections and rivalries andabout how well the communities work together. The consensus was that there are many activities going on, but people often don't realise they are. Perhaps more communication between groups would be useful.

Getting what you need from the Shire The same thing about 'inside knowledge' can apply to the Shire as an organisa-

It is there to serve you. Despite constants efforts to be more accessible it can still seem difficult to find out what you need to know. Please tell me if you are having difficulty. If you ask for some-

thing and don't get the response you think you should, I really want to know. That's one of the reasons you have a Councillor, to help the community to be heard. Specific details are important — who, when what. If you would just like more or different information, ask at the Shire Offices — and if that doesn't work, ask me. Also tell me what has worked well for you, so it can be used again.

Local Transport

Transport was discussed at some length. It seems there are more transport options than most people are aware of. Do you know the bus services available in your town? Is it important for you? One member of the group has already collected the local bus information for publication in this paper. Good work! I will be asking what the Shire's role is in publishing timetables for all local transport services. Where do you think such information should be available? Our Shire sees community transport as a critical issue. In recent consultations for the Community Wellbeing Plan, lack of non car based transport was identified as the stand out issue, affecting particularly older people and adolescents. We have initiated a Transport Working Group to work in partnership with neighbouring Shires to influence State Government transport policy and projects. State government is receptive to this proactive approach. Through this group a proposal has been put to the Department of Infrastructure for the development of a Mobility and Access Strategy for the Shires of Macedon Ranges and Mt.Alexander. The aim is to identify the current public transport opportunities available within the two Shires and to identify ways to better serve community needs.

Use of Funds from Land Sales

Concern was expressed about where money goes when a Shire owned block of land is sold. The answer is, that if blocks were held as investment for community facilities in the future, this intention is honoured by the current Shire and funds from sales are retained for the same community. This will be spelled out clearly in this year's budget. Such blocks are regularly reviewed and may be retained and used for recreation if they are found to be needed.

Lancefield Pool Improvements

Questions were asked about pools. It was disappointing that the State Government did not fund the works on the Lancefield and Woodend outdoor pools, when they awarded the grant for Gisborne Pool only. We asked for funds to proceed with projects in the first stage of our shire-wide aquatic strategy and were

expecting support from State Government for the strategic approach which they have demanded. The Shire will now be fully funding the works planned for the outdoor pools, which will be much more strain on the budget. However the urgent works, identified in the audit done in 2000, have already been carried out. The medium priority works will still be carried out before next season and the low priority works the following year. The issue was raised of community groups hearing first about the outcomes of applications for sport and recreation grants via the papers. It is understandable that committees expect the courtesy of being informed directly. Unfortunately the State Department of Sport and Recreation releases the results of grant applications straight to the media, so our officers have no chance to inform committees first. Letters are then written but the news is old by the time they arrive. You could let State Government know how you feel about this.

Rural Zone Review

Everyone in the Reference Group was given a copy of the consultation paper on the review of the rural zones in the Shire. This paper, which is available from all Shire offices, outlines the results of the research so far and a number of proposed key planning principles to guide the future of the Shire's rural areas. Ring the numbers supplied to discuss, comment or ask questions about the paper. I would also be very interested to hear your views.







What's News

The initial results of last year's census have just been made public. One of the changes noted in the media was the reduction of those Australians who identify themselves as religious, and an increase in those who identify with other religions than Christianity.

As a minister, these results provide no great shock. Recent immigration patterns have been dominated by people with Islamic and Buddhist backgrounds, leading to a rise in other religions. A steady decline in overall church attendance is well known, making a reduction in people who call themselves religious unsurprising.

However, I do wonder just how representative the figures really are. I believe that the relationship between belief in God, religion and church is not as simple as many people assume.

In the course of my work, I meet many people who believe in God, yet would not call themselves religious. I meet other people who are clearly religious, but don't want to have a bar of the church.

For me, belief in God is about recognising that there is something more to this world than simply what we see. Being religious is about that belief making a difference to way we live our lives. This is not about doing good, but about the motivation for all that we do. Church is about finding a group of people whose experience or understanding of God is similar to yours, or who express their religion in ways you find helpful.

In other words, church is about meeting the needs of people. Whilst this may be primarily spiritual needs, it also includes physical and social needs. This is one of the reasons there are so many 'different ' churches, that they are meeting different needs even though they reflect the same religion and belief in God.

People have a range of experiences of the church, many of them bad. In recent times, the media has highlighted some of the worst experiences of the church imaginable. Does the church deserve a second chance? I believe that it has changed significantly in recent years. It may be too little too late, but we are trying to be there for people. The church is about meeting human needs, and in Romsey, we are all here for you. Hopefully one of us can help you when you're in need.

VHOLE FARM PLANNING' COURSES COME TO THE MACEDON RANGES

A 'Whole Farm Planning' course will be offered in Kyneton by the Bendigo Regional Institute of TAFE (BRIT) from July 2002. The course, designed primarily for landholders and managers and people working in landcare related fields, will commence on 25 July from 6-9 pm at Kyneton TAFE.

It is being offered at Kyneton TAFE following a series of meetings between Macedon Ranges Shire Council, the Rural Department of the Bendigo Regional Institute of TAFE (BRIT) and a local group, representing farming interests in the Macedon Ranges Shire.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Chief Executive Officer, Lydia Wilson said the Council had been encouraging the provision of land management courses in the Macedon Ranges, including courses tailored to specific needs. "Who have a great mix of new and traditional farming enes, as well as a strong commitment among people throughout the Shire to improving our natural environment, so there is a great demand for training in effective land management practices, and for training to be provided locally," she said.

The course is an accredited program coordinated by the Department Of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE) and Glenormiston College, and facilitated by the Bendigo Regional Institute of TAFE. The course consists of 6 sessions covering all aspects of Whole Farm Planning and opportunities to develop your property to reach its potential.

The program features a practical, field-based approach with specialist presenters bringing you the latest information on the best ways to develop your property and enhance the farm's natural resources, as well as solving land management or degradation problems.

Online option

Also in July, an online version of the 'Whole Farm Planning' course will be launched, providing a web-based learning alternative. This program includes a two-day workshop, where participants can get together as a learning group and visit properties where whole farm planning principles have been put into action.

The cost of the course is only \$72, which includes a CD and extensive course notes.





Romsey Reflections and Royalty

The throne passed from Edward and Alexandra to their surviving son as King George V who had, in 1893, married Princess Victoria Mary Augusta Louisa Olga Pauline Claudina Agnes

of Tech; they had one daughter and five sons. George had served in the Royal Navy for several years and was 45 when he acceded to the throne.

The reign of King George V and Queen Mary saw many changes in the United Kingdom and The Empire including the Union of South Africa in 1910, World War I 1914-18, the Sinn Fein Rebellion in 1916 leading to the Irish Free State settled in 1922. George and Mary were very popular and George initiated the practice of Christmas Day broadcasts to the nation in 1932; they adopted the family name of Windsor. King George V died in 1936 while Queen Mary survived regally as the Queen Mother until 1953; she devoted her energies to the welfare of women and children and many philanthropic activities.

The eldest Windsor son acceded to the throne on 20th January, 1936 as King Edward VIII. Despite his parent's parading a succession of princesses before him, Edward was determined to marry a twice divorced Boston, U.S.A. lady born Bessie Wallis Warfield but by 1936 she was famous in London's society as Wallis Simpson. Edward abdicated on 11th December, 1936 and married Mrs. Simpson in June, 1937, by which time he had been given the title Duke of Windsor. They shared a luxurious interna-

tional social life for almost 40 years.



 So King George V's second son acceded to the throne as George VI at age 41. He had trained in the Dartmouth Naval College, served in the Battle of Jutland in 1916 and then joined the

Royal Airforce. In 1923 he married the daughter of a Scottish nobleman, Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, in Westminster Abbey. George was a keen tennis player and starred in the Wimbledon Championships in 1926. In 1927 Elizabeth and George visited Australia to open the new Parliament House in Canberra; his father King George V had attended the opening of the first Australian Federal Parliament in Melbourne in 1901.

They had two daughters. Elizabeth Alexandra Mary in 1926 and Margaret Rose in 1930. When George VI unexpectedly became King the clouds of war were already dark over the European continent. Hitler and Mussolini were dictators in Germany and Italy; Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain tried appeasement for months but on 3rd September, 1939 declared that Britain and the Empire were at war with Germany. Elizabeth and George showed outstanding leadership especially during the bombing of London when they remained in residence in Buckingham Palace.

The wars against Europe and Japan ceased in 1945 and in 1947 King George VI toured Southern Africa although it was evident that years of heavy smoking had damaged his health. He persevered with his public duties, one of

the last of which was the opening of the Festival of F in in 1951. He died suddenly on 6th February, 1952, and his elder daughter became Queen Elizabeth II. In 2002 at the age of 101 Elizabeth the Queen Mother died peacefully. She was much loved and even revered.



The British Empire was the last and greatest (most populous) world empire. Its decline and fall occurred within a single generation, beginning with Indian Independence in 1947 and

ending with the creation of Zimbabwe in 1980. In 1947, 21 year old Princess Elizabeth Windsor married Philip Mountbatten, the son of Price Andrew Schleswig Holstein Sondesburg Glucksburg of Greece. His mother, Alice, was a great great granddaughter of Queen Victoria and her brother was Earl Louis Mountbatten of Burma. Philip was born in Corfu in 1921 and educated in the United Kingdom. He served in the Royal Navy from 1939 but retained his Greek citizenship until 1947 when he became British and was created Duke of Edinburgh. The Mountbattens were formerly the Battenbergs bu changed in 1917. They had acquired Broadlands in Romsey, Hampshire - the property previously owned by Lord Palmerston. Elizabeth and Philip celebrated the first part of their honeymoon at Broadlands. They managed to revive most of the family names when christening their four children - Charles Philip Arthur George (born 1948), Andrew Albert Christina Edward (born 1960), Edward Anthony Richard Louis (born 1964) and Anne Elizabeth Alice Louise (born 1950).

In 1954 Queen Elizabeth II made the first visit by a reigning monarch to Australia. In 1960 she changed her family name from Windsor to Mountbatten-Windsor. In February, 2002, she completed her 14th and maybe last Royal visit to Australia (and Jamaica and New Zealand), so that she could open the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting at Coolum. The cause of the Commonwealth has become a personal crusade for her in the rapidly changing world in which the role of Britain has diished.



At home in the U.K. Queen Elizabeth II, now 76, keeps up her interest in the Royal family and still tries to ensure the commercial success of the Royal farms. At Windsor there is a herd

of 200 Ayrshire cattle, a pedigree herd of Jerseys, 1000 sheep plus deer and horses. At Sandringham there are 10,000 acres of cultivated farmland while at Balmoral there are 40,000 acres devoted to 2,500 deer, Luing and Galloway beef cattle and Soay sheep. But her greatest role remains as a steadfast charming Monarch who still draws huge crowds especially on her meet the people walks. Prince Philip at 81 continues to defy tradition, commit gaffes and stir the pot of public opinion. He takes a leadership role in conservation (the W.W.F.) youth affairs (Duke of Edinburgh Awards) and the maintenance of the Royal properties. For the last 20 years he has enjoyed the companionship of a lady much younger than his wife: this attractive blonde with time on her hands to spend with Philip at carriage driving championships, is Lady Romsey!

Elizabeth and Philip's eldest son and the heir apparent to the throne traces his antecedants to James
 VI of Scotland and James of England as well as to

Llewelyn Price of All Wales and the High Kings of Erin. Prince Charles married Lady Diana Spencer in St. Paul's Cathedral on 29th July, 1981. They followed the example of Charles' parents by spending part of their honeymoon at Broadlands, Romsey. They had two sons William (1982) and Henry (better known as Harry) in 1984 so there are now two Princes of Wales of his generation who could acceed to the throne if their father did not do so. The marriage of Diana and Charles was troubled when Charles resumed a relationship with Camilla Parker-Bowles. From 1987 Diana and Charles led separate lives with Diana raising their sons and later devoting time to "Worthy causes". She also sought companionship and hoped she found happiness with Egyptian born Dodi Fayed. Dodi died with her in a tragic car accident in a Paris tunnel in 1997. Diana was born on 1st July, 1961 and was buried at the Spencer family estate, Althorpe, on 6th Septem-997 (she died on 30th August). She was referred to as "the "eople's Princess".

The first week-end in June, 2002, was extended so that as many Britons as possible could share in the celebration of

Queen Elizabeth II's Golden Jubilee in London. The most popular event was the rock concert at Buckingham Palace, said to have been attended by one million people in The Mall and Parks and the 12,000

guests on the lawns of the Palace. Australian Barry Humphries playing his alter-ego Dame Edna Everage proclaimed that her original plan was to host the event at her Moonee Ponds home but became worried about damage to her lawn which her late husband had watered several times every night so she thought of another housewife to host the event and chose The Jubilee Girl Elizabeth II. Performers included Sir Paul McCartney, Sir Cliff Richard, Dame Shirley Bassey and Sir Elton John. Although she probably inserted ear plugs during the music, Elizabeth and the Royal party which included Camilla Parker-Bowles, evidently enjoyed the celebration.

D) the week-end the gold state coach was used for only the utird time in 50 years to convey Elizabeth and Philip to St.

Australia's Royal Mint issued gold and silver coins in very limited numbers in honour of the Golden Jubilee, while Australia Post issued a pair of commemorative stamps on 6th February, 2002.

OPEN FIRES A PLEASURE, BUT CARE NEEDED

One of the pleasures of colder weather is sitting in front of an open fire or glimpsing flames in a solid fuel heater. But don't forget the downside of open fires and solid fuel heaters.

"CFA figures show that open fires and solid fuel heaters are major causes of house fires in winter," Romsey Fire Brigades Community Safety Officer, Robert Smith, said. "Fire screens were needed to provide protection from embers and sparks in open fires, and provided a shield around solid fuel



heaters. All fires needed to be extinguished before the household went to bed or left the house. Never leave a fire alight. Extinguish all flames and embers, and make sure ashes are cold before you dispose of them."

Chimneys need to be cleaned before weather turns cold, to ensure they are not choked with soot and become a fire hazard. "Soot build-up can catch alight and spread throughout the rafters and beams in the roof."

Oil or paint-coated timbers should not be burnt because they release dangerous toxic fumes. And to be safe, firewood should be allowed to dry for 12 months before being used. "It should be stored in a dry and safe place, away from the house, where it can not provide extra fuel in the case of a house fire."

"In addition, clothes drying in front of heaters and open fires can also create a fire hazard," Robert said.
'Drying clothes should be a minimum of two metres away from the heat source, not draped over or near it. And turning appliances off when leaving the house or going to bed is another essential," Robert added. "We strongly advise people to turn off all electrical appliances before they go out or go to sleep. It may be convenient to leave them on, but it's certainly not safe."

Welcome to another rather useful little item on the Mitchell Library home page. At the library we mainly use it as a window into all the other Victorian Library systems' catalogues - an extremely handy little tool as we shall see later on. However, it does have other features that can come in handy from time to time.

Click on Government Information and whacko, suddenly you have access to the following:

Victorian Government home page

Multi-Service Express - Victorian Government services

Australian Government home page

National Library of Australia - Government information page

National Library of Australia - Worldwide government information page

Now go back and click on <u>Weather</u> and a comprehensive weather report for any area of Victoria or any state of Australia is yours.

By clicking on Newsflash you can have access to the day's news via The Age website.

The <u>Libraries Victoria - yours to explore</u> logo answers your questions about any Victorian library - be it bricks and mortar or marvellously mobile. Type in your home town and see.

By clicking on the <u>State Library of Victoria</u> icon an even bigger world is available to you with the State Library's collections, exhibitions, on-line catalogue and even a virtual tour at your fingertips.

Now, let's return to the address boxes in the middle of the page.


<u>Search for a Victorian library website</u> - you can click on any library service in Victoria and see what is on offer at the various libraries, from displays to author visits and everything in between.

Search for an on-line catalogue - Extremely useful little tool. If you are after the absolutely latest novel by Grisham, Steel or Binchy and can't remember the title click into any one of the large library services in Melbourne and chances are that an entry will be made in their catalogue. Just print off the information, bring it along to your local branch and we can reserve it for you (or if you have read Part 1 of Enjoy the Mitchell Library Website, you can do it for yourself.)

Likewise if your life wouldn't be complete without an extremely obscure little book that you read several years ago, but we know longer have in our system, then by searching other library's catalogues you can maybe find your heart's desire. Once found just print its details, including the library system where it is located, and then for the princely sum of \$1.10 we can organise an Inter Library Loan (I.L.L) for you.

<u>Search for on-line information</u> - a good starting point for up-to-date information about current topics with a great little sub-section entitled "Picture Australia". This is a gallery of people, places, events and objects throughout Australia's history. Great for printing off for school projects, etc. Try following the trails - they're great!

BC 'DA PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

We nad a terrific visit from Mr. Keith Baverstock with his traveling Colonial School. On this occasion, the theme of the day was "When Granny and Granddad were Kids", which entailed recreating a schoolroom of the 1950's. A time when children could have butter on their lunches in the shelter shed for the first time since before WW2, and an outing in the new Holden was made possible with the end of petrol rationing.

Fifty or more in a class was normal, (different from the 15-18 class sizes we have at Bolinda today), the strap was an essential part of every class and pen and ink were used at the old wooden desks. The children (and teachers!!) really enjoyed this trip back in time.

Our young people have many wonderful opportunities available to them today, and a while ago I took three of our students to the first Young Leaders' Conference in Melbourne. The following is an edited report by Vanessa, Broand Sophie.

"Mr.J. took us to the Convention Centre in Melbourne to a Young Leaders' Conference. There were 1400 students involved. People came to speak to us such as Monica Gould, the Minister for Education, Paralympian skiing Gold Medallist Bart Bunting and his guide Nathan, Daryl Jones a helicopter rescue pilot, Joy Smithers, a TV actor (Rosa from All Saints) and Peter Tresider, an explorer who has walked to the South Pole.

They all spoke about setting and achieving goals, looking to the future, helping others and what it means to be a leader.

A student called Mark Winkler told us about a boy in Canada who wanted to raise \$70 for a well for a village in Africa and he raised \$6000 !!! Mark told us to set goals, keep going, believe in ourselves and have heroes. We had a lot of fun and learnt a lot."

What a wonderful learning experience for the children to hear from people like these.
