

November in the garden

Weeding is occupying a lot of my time both at home and at a couple of community projects to which I contribute. The wretched things! And you have to get them out roots and all before they set seed as well we know "one year's seeding is seven years weeding". I use a handy dandy little three prong cultivator which I affectionately call my scratcher which makes it very easy to drag weeds out of the soil. In lawns I use a good old-fashioned daisy weeder which makes removing capeweed a breeze! And did you know that capeweed favours acidic soil conditions, so if you lime your soil, you will create an unfavourable pH for them.

My vivid blue ceanothus is proving to be a Mecca for the bees, as are the new flowers on my Banksia blechnifolia. This ground covering banksia produces flowers at foot level so you really have to get down on your hands and knees to appreciate its beauty! Also doing well in my garden is a bright yellow osteospermum known as the African daisy and more commonly seen in shades of purple and white. It strikes easily from cuttings and grows quite quickly and seems to be covered in flowers all year round. I have another daisy currently unidentified which has two-tone yellow flowers and blue-grey foliage which is also looking wonderful. Daisies are such uncomplicated and cheery flowers.

My Eucalyptus caesia 'Silver Princess' is also in full bloom with huge pinky-red flowers tipped with yellow. These contrast nicely with the silver-grey foliage and purple flowers of Eremophila nivea, the large purple flowers of Alyogyne huegellii 'West Coast Gem' and down low hugging the rock is a beautiful purple brachycome daisy. I do love purple in my garden!

Spring rolls on and the last half dozen of the 100 red tulips I planted over a decade ago are about to bloom. I think the other 90 failed because they were baked to death over summer.



Other bulbs to do well here are all the daffodils, grape hyacinths, pineapple lilies, ixias, arums, scilla and gladiolus. Actually, the spring flowering Gladiolus cardinalis 'Amanda Mahy' is budding up nicely and will soon be a blaze of tangerine! It's a great undemanding bulb that has multiplied nicely and is a welcome burst of colour when it blooms.

Elsewhere in the garden the wattles are finishing and the odd blob of lilac on the ground proves to be one of the carpobrotus flowers, it is doing a great job as a weed suppressing ground cover. The berberis is coming into its purplish bronze leaves and soon the smokebush will be bursting into leaf too. My succulent collection is waking up too with many of them flowering now. I have cute little hanging blooms on my echeverias in red, orange and yellow, most of the sedums are yellow and my aeoniums are all yellow except for one which is white. Most succulent enthusiasts will tell you to cut off the flowers because they attract aphids but its up to you. I like to let mine bloom!

In the vegetable garden (if I had one) I would be taking the opportunity to dig compost and manure into the beds in readiness for the summer seedling planting blitz in late October. Its always a conundrum to know how long to leave the winter crops before you need to plant the summer crops! And that white variegated Hebe 'Abbey Rose' that stressed a brilliant hot pink? As soon as I moved the pot up against the house the plant began to lose its colour. So, the small amount of shelter and warmth radiating off the house helped it to become less stressed. It is almost completely back to being green and white again!





Queers on the Catwalk

An evening celebrating fashion, self-expression and affirmation is planned for the Macedon Ranges later this month. 'Queers on the Catwalk' will celebrate rural and regional pride with a focus on LGBTIQA+ identity expression through clothing and accessories. After the success of the first Queers on the Catwalk in October 2019, this year's event will bring together both young and old members of the LGBTIQA+ community as they exhibit their outfits, costumes and catwalk collections.

Some of the participants got together a few weeks ago for a costume-making workshop hosted by Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health's WayOut and CLIP teams alongside TGD Clothing Swap and The Story Costumer.

"The workshop provided a safe space for participants to connect and share their experiences of living queer in a regional setting," says WayOut Project Worker, Rhani Dean-Talbett. "We explored how this may or may not have influenced self-expression through clothing and fashion over the years and we helped those attending find their catwalk groove and confidence to walk the runway."

The Queers on the Catwalk event will be captured on film and be made available to all catwalkers and crew and interested participants are also invited to get involved behind the camera and build their capacity in video production.

"Participants are encouraged to invite friends, family and significant others to watch them 'strut their stuff' on the catwalk to their signature audio tracks," says Rhani. "The event will be a colourful celebration of individualism and authenticity."

Take a walk on the wild side



Lou Reed might have had something else in mind but walking along our local roads is a pleasure, especially at this time of the year.

The weather is generally agreeable, the paddocks are lush and the bush is vibrant. Added bonuses include the increased bird activity and the blooming of many of our wildflowers.

Even in areas that are mown regularly, plants such as Running Postman and Creeping Bossiaea appear to thrive, particularly if the grass is not cut too short. However, it is along the roadsides where nature is allowed to take its course that many of our local wildflowers are making their appearance.

Some of these wonders of nature are quite small so it pays to slow down and observe.

As well as being beautiful, they are an important part of the ecosystem. Native wildflowers evolved with insects, birds and animals over thousands of years, and many of our flower and insect species are interdependent, relying on one another in symbiotic relationships. Wildflowers provide nectar for butterflies and act as host plants for emerging larvae. Small birds relish those juicy caterpillars as well as wildflower seeds. Pollinators such as bees, wasps, flies and other insects visit wildflowers for nectar and pollen. This is especially important for those that have small home ranges or depend on one or two specific host plant species. Pollinators are in turn an important food source for many birds and play a vital role in maintaining biodiversity and pollinating our food crops.

Unfortunately, many wildflower species have been lost to development and the spread of invasive plants so it is important to cherish and protect them where we can.

Most of our observations have been made along Red Gap and West Goldie roads, north of Lancefield but I am sure that there are unique wildflowers blooming along a road near you! In the Macedon Ranges 376 animal species have been sighted and there are 1457 varieties of native plants. The MRSC's website is a great source of information under the heading "Native Plants of the Macedon Ranges".

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. WARM POTATO SALAD:

- 4 medium potatoes
- 3 hardboiled eggs– cut roughly
- · 3 onions diced
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1pkt cream of chicken soup
- 1 cup of milk
- 1 cup of water
- Breadcrumbs to sprinkle on top

Method:

- 1. Cut potatoes into cubes and boil until cooked.
- 2. Put potatoes, onion, cheese and eggs in a bowl.
- 3. Make soup with 1 cup milk and 1 cup of water. Stir until soup boils and thickens.
- 4. Pour soup over the other ingredients and mix. Then place in a casserole dish.
- 5. Sprinkle breadcrumbs over the top and cover with more grated cheese.
- Cook in a moderate oven until turns golden brown.

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Making Macedon Kinders Safer With Better Ventilation

The Victorian Government is helping kindergarten services in Macedon reduce the risk of coronavirus transmission, with support for better ventilation measures to help keep children and staff COVIDSafe.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas today announced more than \$7.5 million worth of grants statewide will be available for local not-for-profit kindergarten services to support additional ventilation and air purification measures.

Funding will be available from Monday 18 October and is open to all Victorian not-for-profit funded sessional and long day care providers offering a funded three or four-year-old kindergarten program.

Eligible services will be sent an email where they simply opt-in for the grant - which can be spent on ventilation and air purification enhancements as well as small-scale building works like adding or replacing windows and installing outdoor shade structures to increase learning outside.

Many Victorian early childhood education and care services can already create environments with good ventilation through opening windows and doors, and using existing outdoor learning spaces to reduce the risk of COVID-19 infection.

Air purification is also an important measure for spaces where there may be limited ability to increase ventilation, such as kitchens or staff areas.

This follows the Victorian Chief Health Officer's directions that vaccination is a requirement of work in an

early childhood setting – protecting children, staff and the broader community.

All workers in early childhood settings must have a first dose by 25 October, with full vaccination required by 29 November unless a medical exemption applies.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

G'day all you eager cooks.

Do you remember when our mums cooked lamb's liver (Lamb's Fry) for breakfast nearly every morning? It was an Aussie must with a fried egg. Both she'd overcook so the liver was grey and tough, the egg white crisp around the edges, and the yolk hard. Nevertheless, we gobbled it down with the ubiquitous lumpy gravy,

Well, lamb's fry may have been replaced with cornflakes, but offal is making a BIG comeback. And as calf's liver has a lighter flavour than most (or all) other offal, I've chosen it to present to you.

I've pretended I'm an Italian, and so have used Marsala (also because I reckon the flavour's good-oh). If my mum was alive she'd reckon I was skiting.

Anyway, Mum, your gravy was awful - out of a tin, with water added. But you, Mum, were out of Ballarat, with wine added and were delicious.





CALF'S LIVER VENEZIANA.

Calf's liver has a light flavour compared to other offal. Cook it correctly and it will melt in your mouth. For maximum flavour it is important to sear liver over a high heat and keep the centre just pink. Overcook the liver and it will be tough and grey. Do not wash liver or it will discolour when cooked.

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 40 g butter
- 450 g thinly sliced red onions
- 450 g thinly sliced calf's liver
- 2 tablespoons plain flour
- 6 sage leaves

- 4 tablespoons good Marsala wine
- 2 tablespoons red wine (drink the rest)
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper (to your taste).

Method

- 1. Heat the oil and half the butter in a large frying pan, add the onions and cook over a low heat for about 15 minutes, or until they become very soft and translucent.
- 2. Pat the liver dry with kitchen paper towels and cut it into strips 1 cm wide.
- 3. On a large plate, season the flour with salt and pepper then coat the liver with it.
- 4. Now, remove the onions from the pan and keep them warm.
- 5. Turn up the heat under the pan and drop in the strips of liver and the sage leaves. Cook until browned about 2 minutes.
- 6. Add the Marsala and red wine and cook for another 2 minutes, thereby slightly reducing the liquid.
- 7. Put the onions back into the pan and stir in the rest of the butter and the parsley. Cook for a further 2 minutes and serve with mashed potatoes.

PS. If you don't have any Sage - or Marsala, try to get some - if you are unsuccessful, warm a good splash of soy sauce, add a nip of brandy and enough Natural Greek Yoghurt to balance the soy, in other words turn the sauce a light brown colour. Add it with the extra butter and parsley.

Suddenly it won't be Italian - but neither was my Mum nor I.

Winners will be announced at an online event in November.





Discover Springfield

Do you look around, across the hills and wide paddocks when you are travelling the Romsey-Melbourne Road, and wonder what it was like years ago? 50, 100, 250, 500 years ago?

East of Romsey are a line of hills. Broadly, this is called Springfield – rolling paddocks, some steep slopes, much cleared but still some forested areas. Originally this was within the lands of the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin nation, prior to the exploration of the Port Phillip district and then, under lease from the early Governors, occupation by early squatters. Following this time of change, government became more established, and land could be bought. It was bought and settled by white immigrant families. Many descendants remain in the Romsey and Lancefield districts.

"Discover Springfield" is the history of this area – information has come from old newspapers, photos, letters and anecdotes from members of the settler families. Published by the Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society, it tells the stories of the people, and of the institutions that once were in Springfield, but are no more school, post office, church. We learn about earning an income off the land before labour-saving machines or telephones (or motor vehicles) - working together to make a living and a community!

More Support for Student Mental Health And Wellbeing

Schools in Macedon will be able to pick the mental health tools that best match the needs of their students, with the Victorian Government's Schools Mental Health Fund providing a suite of options to give students tailored support.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas today revealed the interim menu of resources and initiatives to be available to government schools in Macedon as part of the \$200 million Fund, designed to better support students' mental health.

Schools will be able to select evidence-based programs and initiatives from the online menu across three tiers of intervention:

- Tier One: positive mental health promotion, including initiatives like Active Schools, mental health first aid, anti-bullying programs and therapy dogs as wholeschool investments to help create a positive, inclusive environment, as well as mental health literacy training to ensure mental health issues are addressed early
- Tier Two: early intervention and cohort-specific initiatives including cross-cultural responsiveness training, Arts Therapy or trauma informed care, ensuring programs cater to all students
- Tier Three: targeted support for those experiencing mental health issues such as additional mental health professionals, additional Headspace counselling, or suicide related support

As per the recommendations of the Royal Commission, the Fund will be implemented in all government schools across regional Victoria from mid-2022 and will be in every state school by 2024.

This comes on top of the Government's completed rollout of a mental health practitioner in every government secondary school. Further, an additional 74 primary schools across Victoria will join the Mental Health in Primary Schools Pilot in 2022 – bringing the total number of schools in the pilot to 100.

A partnership with the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, the Mental Health in Primary Schools Pilot provides schools with funding for a Mental Health and Wellbeing Lead to implement a whole-school approach to mental health and wellbeing aimed at younger children.

Work to reform the state's mental health services is well underway, with a record \$3.8 billion allocated in the Victorian Budget 2021/22 to deliver every single recommendation of the Royal Commission and build a system that works for every Victorian.

Spring Growth: It may seem hard to believe but the weather is slowly warming up and the grass, bushes and trees are really on the move. It is quite common to see up to 2m of new growth on the top of middle aged trees and the younger ones have about 50% new growth. The grass of course does not want to be left out of this and it is powering along. The whole of Romsey park was mown in the 2nd week of October and will have to be mown again each week until early/mid November. This is a heavy call on the human and machinery resources of the club but if we want an attractive park and a well presented golf course then this annual "working Bee" must continue. Our thanks to Mal Mottram, Ron Walker, Steve Wilkins, Bob McLennan, Andreew Clement & John Freestone for their time and effort to keep everything in its best possible condition

Cross-overs: One element of the major works at the park last year was the construction of numereous cross-overs so that motorised and push buggies could easily and safely cross the drains. Piping and crushed rock was put in place but without edging the crushed rock was gradually wandering away from the pipe. Rob Good was able to get the club over 100 treated pine posts from a winery, these posts had been broken off at the ground by harvesting and other machinery. The club designed an edging system using these posts that is hardy, looks attractive and will keep the crossovers in good condition for many years to come.

New Gardens: In late autumn the golf club planted two gardens of native flowering bushes and exotoic flowering trees. So far we have only lost one plant. The onset of spring saw tremendous growth of capeweed which threatened to overpower the young bushes and trees. Both gardens were heavily weeded and then a 150+mm layer of mulch was added to help the plants through their first summer. 

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Pastor's Parables

Christianity and Evolution It takes more faith to believe in evolution than in God

If someone said he had a theory that elephants evolved from prehistoric flying pigs, we might want to see their evidence before accepting it as fact. If they said they'd found no evidence or the evidence was missing, it would take a great step of faith to believe their theory.

Evolution is a belief that in the beginning there was nothing – the nothing exploded and gradually created everything.

It would seem the world's greatest faith is placed in evolution and its ever-changing theories. Yet generally unbeknown to the believing public, no palaeontologist has presented any supportable evidence of the problematic transition from one species to another, especially when considering more than 250 000 different fossil species have been found to date. The link between man and ape remains missing. All supposed links between dinosaurs and birds have been refuted by experts in the field as unfit candidates.

It is ironic that many people refute beliefs of Christianity on the basis of a

lack of supportable evidence, but happily turn to theories of evolution, never once questioning – where is the evidence?

Still, many people object to the idea of God, thinking that such a belief is not scientific. You may be surprised how many well-known, respected scientists (both past and present) conclude that there is an ingenious Creator behind creation and have strong Christian views.



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

Imagine a world without violence

Wednesday 25 November is the International Day for the elimination of violence against women and 10 December is Human Rights Day. The 16 days that begin and end on these dates are recognised internationally as the '16 Days of Activism' to prevent violence against women.

This is not just an issue in other places and other nations. In Australia, on average, one woman a week is murdered by her current or former partner and as well, intimate partner violence is the leading cause of death, disability and illness in Australian women aged 18-44 years.

This year, the Zonta Club of Kyneton is working with several other local community organisations, through Macedon Ranges 16 Days of Activism Working Group, to raise awareness of gender-based violence, challenge discriminatory attitudes and encourage community-based support for those living with violence.

Bystander action will be the focus of print media and social media releases being prepared by the Zonta Club. The 16 days working group has organised an online workshop, 'Introduction to Bystander Action', to be delivered by Women's health Loddon Mallee. Public libraries across the Macedon Ranges will partner with the Zonta Club of Kyneton to create displays that focus on prevention of violence against women.


