



Autumn is such a great time to get out and about and visit nurseries and gardens! So far we have paid a visit to Lambley Gardens and Nursery in Ascot near Creswick. In case you didn't know, this premium destination for garden lovers is on the market. I thought I had better pay a visit in case it was my last! The gardens were amazing as always and we came away with five Virginia creepers (Parthenocissus quinquefolia) destined for our new pergola to provide summer shade and winter sun to the deck beneath.

We also visited the Secret Garden nursery in Daylesford which was crammed full of delightful plants and many different types of garden art. In Trentham we dropped into Autumn Joy nursery- this has a good range of cool climate trees in rocket pots. Gardens visited included two open gardens in Trentham. At the first we admired an interesting front 'fence' made of vertical bush poles sunk in the ground (designed to let kangaroos pass through) and at the second we thought the outside bath (with hot and cold water!) situated under a creeper clad arbour was pretty amazing. That's the beauty of garden visiting – it gives you all sorts of exposure to new plants to admire and landscaping ideas to implement in your garden.

Down in town recently, I visited two stationeer gardens in Northcote. These are gardens around railway stations under



the auspice of the Keep Australia Beautiful Victoria organisation and maintained by volunteers. There are over 50 stationeer groups across Victoria! I have recently set up the Riddells Creek Stationeers group to maintain the gardens around the station and our happy band of three are looking for more people to join us! Why does RRBATA exist and what does it do?

Many community members only know RRBATA (Romsey Region Business and Tourism Association) for the events it has organised over many years (Christmas in Romsey Festival, annual Breakfast and Dinner events, the 150th Anniversary Dinner, Light up the Sky etc).

However, RRBATA is so much more than an "event organiser".

RRBATA's overarching vision is for a vibrant, collaborative and prosperous eastern corridor community which enhances liveability in the region. RRBATA is committed to actively collaborating with business, community and government to advocate for initiatives that foster regional prosperity.

The Business Breakfast and Dinner events, as well as the bi-monthly After Work Business Catch Ups provide forums for discussion and exchange of ideas. RRBATA's advocacy to Macedon Ranges Shire Council (both directly and with its seat at the Business and Tourism Industry Stakeholder group – BATI), State and Federal government bodies, Daylesford Macedon Tourism (the regional tourism board) and Tourism Macedon Ranges is ongoing in order to promote eastern corridor economic development and the visitor economy. This includes promotion of member businesses to the local community and regional visitors.

For the past two years, RRBATA received State Government funding to support professional social media marketing of our region and its businesses.

Very soon, RRBATA will launch its new website which will showcase our wonderful "eastern corridor" and its businesses.


RRBATA's membership is always growing with member businesses spread between Lancefield, Romsey, Darraweit, Monegeetta and Chintin.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

G'day,

My Mum was an intelligent, charming and beautiful woman. So much so, she didn't need a special day for me, or others, to remember her.

I'm not against Mothers Day, mind you. I'm all for it as long as I don't have to buy a washing machine - or an expensive kitchen appliance which will live its whole life in the back of a kitchen drawer together with all the other useless, save-time appliances which we can't do without.

My Mum was a practical person who used a knife to cut carrots, or a hand grater to grate enough for our family meal. If she was going to feed 100, she'd not use grated carrot.

She also had an understanding of how to read a recipe. If the recipe called for an avocado and she didn't have one, she'd use a banana, so the recipe would then taste of banana instead of avocado. She'd adjust one or two other ingredients, if necessary, but she believed in the integrity of the original recipe.

She didn't add other ingredients for the sake of 'owning' the recipe, in fact she was memorable for her Bread & Butter pudding, which she pinched from her Mum, who nicked it from her Mum and so on. No doubt I'll pass it on in fact here it is. Good on yer Mum!

PS. Lemon Curd was what I was called at the footy the other day - or I think I was!



BREAD & BUTTER PUDDING

Ingredients

- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 tablespoons castor sugar
- 1 3/4 cups milk
- 1/3 cup sultanas
- · 2 tablespoons lemon curd
- 2 1/2 tablespoon butter
- · 5 thin slices of bread
- pinch of cinnamon.

Method

- Cut the crusts off the bread, spread the slices with butter then lemon curd and cut them into quarters.
 Butter an oven-proof dish and fill with layers of bread, sprinkling each layer with sultanas and some cinnamon.
- 2. Make a thick custard using the eggs, milk and sugar, and pour it over the bread. Sprinkle with more cinnamon, pop it in the oven at 160 deg.C and cook for half an hour or until it's firm and golden.

LEMON CURD

Ingredients

- 125 g butter
- 1 1/4 cups castor sugar
- · 2 large eggs
- juice and finely grated rind of 2 large lemons

Method

- 1. Put the butter and sugar into the top of a double boiler, then pop the double boiler on top of the base filled with boiling water. Or you can use a large basin sitting in the top of a saucepan of boiling water. But don't let the boiling water touch the bottom of the basin because that'll make the mixture too hot or it might even crack the basin!
- 2. Stir the butter and sugar together until the butter is completely melted, then stir in the eggs which you've lightly beaten together with the lemon juice and rind. Keep stirring until it's thick enough to coat the wooden spoon or whatever you're stirring with.
- 3. Pour the Lemon Curd into hot sterilised jars, put on airtight lids and let it cool till it's ready to eat. Keeps for about 3 weeks in a dry, cool place.



Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society may be forced to close its doors!

The Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society Inc. was formed in April 1979 to preserve all written and photographic items relating to the former Shire of Romsey. This Shire existed from 1862 until it was amalgamated in 1995 to become part of the Macedon Ranges Shire.

The former Shire covered 628 square kilometres and included the townships of Benloch, Bolinda, Cherokee, Chintin, Clarkefield, Darraweit Guim, Kerrie, Lancefield, Monegeetta, Mount William, Riddells Creek, Rochford, Romsey, Springfield and Tantaraboo. Our rich pre-history includes the Aboriginal Greenstone Quarry at Mount William and the Archaeological Megafauna site in the old swamp at Lancefield Park.

Our collection of documents, artefacts and photographs of Romsey, Lancefield and its surrounding districts are a great asset to the area. This collection informs us about the lives of the traditional owners of the land as well as our pioneering families, our businesses and the society we have become.

The Society's collections include family trees, manuscripts, town histories, church histories, school histories, club histories, businesses and many more. Today the Society continues to document our history, adding to existing papers relating to its earliest history through to the twenty-first century.

When the Society began in 1979 – and up until the last few decades – locals with a passion for their township's history, volunteered regularly and began to collect documents, photographs and artefacts. In the early 1980s, Sidney Seymour Cottage was bequeathed to the Society and restoration and work on the cottage was maintained until the last two decades. In 1983 the society moved into the former Lancefield Courthouse where it remains today. Originally established as a Museum, the Courthouse has operated only as an historical society since the 2000s.

Residents of the two largest townships, Romsey and Lancefield, have been involved in the Society for many years. However, over the past decade, fewer and fewer members of the public have maintained an interest in the Society; fewer and few currently volunteer their time for the ongoing collection of material and maintenance of the existing collections. In the past five years the number of members and of volunteers has dwindled further. In 2023 there are only around 40 members of the Society, and only a handful are actively involved. The current committee struggle to fulfill the roles of President, Secretary, Treasurer and general committee.

With these statistics, it is clear the Society cannot continue to operate.

If you want to see the very valuable asset to the local towns that IS the historical society – we need action from the community now! We need local residents who feel passionate about their township to come forward and support the Society. For example, we desperately require volunteers to collect and file documents – such as weekly newspaper clippings. We need people to file family history documents. We regularly receive photographs of local people, houses and businesses and they need to be sorted and filed.

Without volunteers, without enthusiasm and eagerness to maintain the Society and therefore the history of Lancefield, Romsey, Newham, Darraweit Guim, Bolinda and the smaller surrounding villages – we will be closing our doors!

Premiership Success for Romsey's Cricketers

After 40 years Romsey Cricket Club won its first McIntyre Cup premiership having last won in 1982/83 season, also in dramatic circumstances.

After a season long build up all three senior teams played off in Grand Finals for the second season in a row cementing Romsey as one of the strongest cricket clubs in the region. In 2021/22 the cricket Gods assessed it was the turn of the Second & Third Eleven to salute and now in 2022/23 the First Eleven had a much deserved victory based on the team ethos with contributions from all players during the finals series.

After winning the toss captain, Ben Way elected to bat and after an early solid start things became more concerning at 4/55 after a couple of run outs early in the day. At this stage Ben was joined by Taylor Stevenson and on an extremely slow outfield at Sunbury United they staged a match shaping partnership of 109 which was only broken late in the day

when Ben was dismissed for 67 looking to increase the run rate. A flurry of late wickets amongst some lower order runs left Romsey all out for 199 with Taylor top scoring for a patient 68 off 156 balls.

Having bowled out ladder leading Gisborne in the Semi Final for 123, led by fast bowler Louis Moor's brutal 5 wicket haul, there was a genuine sense of destiny as the club enjoyed Senior Presentation Night together after the first day of play. A true sense of this being our time circulated in the room, highlighted by a compelling speech from the unlucky Darrin Jewell who was the unfortunate player to miss out in finals as 12 simply can't go into 11, having been a critical piece of the puzzle in the development of the recent success of the club.

Day 2 commenced with Adam Frost ball in hand and the early wicket of fast scoring Ramaweera, when caught behind by Chris Burkett off Aaron Paterson was a significant start to now make run rate critical in the game. A steady build took Sunbury United to be 3/126 with Edwards making his half century and United captain Fernando looking solid at the crease. However, belief remained, and the dismissal of Edwards by Jamie Taylor meant the game was very alive. Impressive bowling spells and regular rotation of the bowling group saw four wickets fall over the next 14 overs to have United at 7/172 needing 27 runs for the title from 32 balls with the key Fernando still at the crease.

Showing faith in the team based attitude that has served the team all year Ben turned to Corey Day for his third spell of the day having picked up 2 wickets from his earlier 4 overs. Corey prized the wicket of dangerous keeper Watts, caught by Tim Dale and the following over Taylor removed the big wicket of Fernando – caught at long on by Nathan Hoy. The next ball saw the ball skied and as it pouched in the hands of Matt Milne, United finished up all out for 172. The 40 year wait was over and celebrations erupted. With his all round performance of 68 runs, 3 for 43 off 21.3 overs and two catches, Taylor Stevenson was awarded the Gary Sanders Medal as player of the match.

Romsey Challenge Bowl: Heavy overnight rain on Tue/Wed put a scare through the club but by Thurs everything had dried out, the heavy overnight dew soon burned off as the sun came out making for a beautiful day. The course was in top condition. 14 teams from Dalhousie and other local clubs assembled for the event. There was the usual catching up that always accompanies these activities but once the women teed off it was down to some serious golf. On a wonderful day to be out on the course the winners were Kilmore Golf Club; Helen Dennett (15) 32 pts, Jill Banon (29) 38 pts & Sophie Banon (25) 30 pts -100pts were presented with their trophy by Kelly Scott, T. J. Scott & Son, the day's sponsors.

Register your burn-offs as Fire Danger Period ends





The Country Fire Authority (CFA) has announced that the Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges was lifted on Wednesday 12 April.

Residents wishing to conduct a burn-off after that time must ensure they are abiding by Council local laws, which prevent burn-offs on land less than 4000 square metres (one acre) without a permit.

All burn-offs must also be registered online at www. firepermits.vic.gov.au or by calling ESTA on 1800 668 511.

Residents are also reminded to check for wildlife which may be nesting in burn piles. Wildlife officers recommend using a torch and a broom, or pole, to carefully check the centre and bottom areas of the pile. A spade or fork could cause serious injury to an animal.

CFA's North-West Region Manager Community Safety, David Allen, said it was important residents registered their burn. "Registering your burn-off ensures that if smoke or fire is reported, the incident is cross-checked with our register, which prevents firefighters from unnecessarily responding," he said.

Mr Allen said that, if possible, landowners should also notify their neighbours and others nearby who may be sensitive to smoke, so they can take necessary precautions.

Green waste disposal is free at Council's resource recovery facilities (transfer stations) for ratepayers and tenants in the Macedon Ranges. For information visit mrsc.vic.gov.au/transfer-stations

Council's Health Unit update

Staying safe from mosquitoes

The Department of Health has recently detected mosquitoes carrying Murray Valley encephalitis virus (MVE) and Japanese Encephalitis Virus (JEV) in some parts of Victoria and is advising visitors to these areas to be diligent and take precautions to protect themselves from mosquito bites in these areas.

Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites, which can lead to serious health problems for some people. Recent wet and warm weather has increased mosquito breeding.

As at Sunday 29 January 2023, the following local government areas (LGAs) are considered high-risk for mosquito-borne disease: Benalla, Buloke, Campaspe, Gannawarra, Greater Bendigo, Greater Shepparton, Hindmarsh, Horsham, Indigo, Loddon, Mildura, Moira, Northern Grampians Shire, Strathbogie, Swan Hill, Wangaratta, West Wimmera, Wodonga and Yarriambiack.

The best way to prevent mosquito-borne diseases is to avoid mosquito bites. If planning a visit to a high-risk LGA, you're is advised to: use insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin if outdoors when mosquitoes are observed, from October to March – families should always follow the instructions on the repellent to ensure it is appropriate for young children wear long, loose-fitting clothing if mosquitoes are around and cover exposed skin as much as possible limit outdoor activity when mosquitoes are active.

Let's Keep the Macedon Ranges Beautiful



The Macedon Ranges are not only a great place to live –they are beautiful. Let's keep it that way but unfortunately there are a few things working against us. Litter is one of them, rubbish dumping is another.

As part of our commitment to the Keep Australia Beautiful campaign, our Deep Creek Landcare Group does a roadside clean-up, twice a year, between Doggetts Bridge and the crossroads in Lancefield. We generally pick up about 14 bags of litter but on Sunday, March 26 the final tally was 22 bags plus an assortment of large items such as tyres. Well known fast food outlets were well represented in our collection as well as the paper, cardboard and plastic packaging from many fast food products. In addition, we are still picking up many cans and bottles. A big thank-you to the 7 Landcare members who gave up a couple of hours of their time on Sunday to pick up the litter. Also, special thanks to the residents along the Lancefield/Kilmore road who keep the roadside along their boundary litter free. Mostly, they pick up the litter before mowing which is better than breaking up glass bottles, chopping plastic into small pieces and ripping up metal cans. In an ideal world people wouldn't throw out litter as they make their way along our roads, ignoring the environmental hazards they create, the work they create for others to clean up their mess and the damage they do to the aesthetic beauty of our countryside.

The dumping of rubbish along country roads is also an issue for us and in many other parts of the state and I fear that it will get worse in the Ranges as our population increases. I don't know the solution. We have a terrific four bin system and waste collection centres that take virtually anything. The Romsey Transfer Station will take plastic bottle top lids, soft plastics and most garden waste free of charge. We are even able to take home free mulch for the garden! Other items incur a charge but that is not a surprise given the cost of running the transfer stations and rubbish tips. Users should pay at least part of the cost but unfortunately the cost of cleaning up the selfish dumping of rubbish falls on ratepayers and the environment.

The environment can also suffer from the dumping of garden waste. Many garden plants, most of which are still available in nurseries, have the capacity to be a weed if they escape onto roadsides or into the bush. They often outcompete indigenous plants and take over large areas which have a domino effect on our insect population and native animals. Plants to watch include: agapanthus, english ivy, cotoneaster, crocosmia, privet, broom, angled onion, arum lily, castor oil plant, cape tulip, evening primrose, gazania and periwinkle. Grasses like bent grass, kikuyu and various forms of couch as well as trees such as sweet pittosporum, radiata pine, sycamore maple and cootamundra wattle can also spread quickly. We need to be aware of the capacity of plants in our garden to become weeds, dead head such plants to prevent seeding and dispose of the seeds and plants responsibly. We are fortunate that garden waste can be put in our FOGO bins which will be composted at a sufficiently high temperature to destroy their capacity to regenerate.

Our beautiful district has enough challenges from climate change and a growing population without us adding to them unnecessarily. Let's do the right thing, encourage others to do the same and keep the Macedon Ranges beautiful.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. 






From the Desk of Pastor Tim


Jesus, in all His interactions with people, always honoured women, showed the worth and dignity of women and recognised the intrinsic equality of men and women.



The Gallery will again be hosting an art prize next autumn, this time focusing on portraiture. Look out for further details soon but start thinking about who you might like to portray.




