RRBATA Strategic Plan Adopted



Cornish Pastie

Ingredients

- 250g minced beef
- 3 Potatoes, peeled and grated
- 2 Large carrots grated
- 1 Turnip peeled and grated
- 1 onion finley chopped

- 1/3 cup finely chopped parsley
- Salt and pepper
- 4 sheets frozen shortcrust or puff pastry thawed

Method

- 1. Pre heat oven to 200c. Place all above ingredients into a bowl and mix together.
- 2. Place one sheet of pastry down cut into shape for a pasty, pile filling in one half ,fold over and seal pinching edges together (with your fingers or a fork)Lightly brush with a beaten egg.
- 3. Place on a tray and bake for 5 mins at 200 then lower oven to 180 and bake for 15 mins more. Or until pastry browns and juices start to leak from the pasty.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

At the moment, I'm reading about the Independence of India - the end of the British Raj - so it's appropriate that I suggest a Bengali spinach recipe.

The trick with this idea is to not overcook the greens. (If you don't have spinach you can substitute kale, rocket, silverbeet or similar.)

The original recipe allows for the subtle flavour of the spinach to come through. If you use a stronger flavoured green you will no doubt find the other flavours more subservient to it.

Anyway, folks, don't use an aluminium or cast-iron pot as they tend to discolour the result. Use stainless steel if possible.



BENGALI SPINACH

Ingredients

- 2 kg spinach
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon cumin seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon fenugreek seeds
- 1 teaspoon chopped seeded green chillies
- 2 teaspoons minced ginger
- · 2 teaspoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice

Method

- 1. Put the spinach into a 5 litre saucepan, sprinkle a few drops of water over it, pop on a lid and cook over a moderate heat until the spinach softens about 5 minutes. Take the spinach out of the pan, draining off all the liquid.
- 2. Put 1 tablespoon of butter into the dry saucepan and put it back over the moderate heat. When the butter's melted and hot drop in the cumin seeds and fry them until they change colour. Then sprinkle in the fenugreek seeds and fry them briefly until they darken a little. Next add the chili and ginger and stir them for half a minute before adding the drained spinach. Stir again and lastly add the sugar, nutmeg, lemon juice and the rest of the butter.
- 3. Cook for another minute, take it off the heat and serve immediately.

Local Law review update

Council's current General Purposes and Amenity Local Law of 2013 is due to expire in September 2023.

Council recently sought community feedback on the proposed draft Community Local Law 2023 during consultation held from 28 March - 30 April 2023.

Council would like to thank everyone who participated in the consultation. The submissions and responses received represent a broad range of feedback for which we are currently consolidating all responses. Next steps will be to consider any emerging issues and make necessary refinements to the draft Community Local Law 2023. This consolidation process will involve council officers, staff from our legal firm, and also Councillors at a future Council briefing.

The draft Community Local Law 2023 (including any amendments made following community consultation) will need to be adopted by Council at a future Council Meeting, prior to any implementation. 

With a spot of luck there will be some growth before the continuous cold of winter hits and the new green will be in play come spring. Great work by Mitch, Sevi, Tyler, Harry, Carl and Mal. Just goes to show what a dedicated group if volunteers can accomplish



One Generation Doesn't Plan... Another Gets Cooked



The front page of the Romsey Rag May edition attracted my interest with a lovely photo of a tree lined street and the caption "Old Chinese Proverb says... One generation plants trees, another gets the shade." For Landcare groups like us, planting trees and looking to leave the place livable for future generations is in our DNA.

I have often written about the importance of planting indigenous trees, shrubs and native grasses to the environment but right now I wish to focus on the value trees give in providing summer shade.

There is a lot of angst about the suburbanization of the Macedon Ranges that is echoed right around the country in similar locations. A drive around the new developments in the outer suburbs of Melbourne or almost anywhere will quickly reinforce those fears. The allotments are small (relative to house sizes), the residential streets are narrow and nature strips are almost non-existent; contrast this to many of the older streets in Lancefield and Romsey. I understand the reasons behind the trend, a rapidly growing population and a dire need to build affordable housing but at what cost? I am worried that if one generation doesn't plan, another gets cooked!

Trees cool the environment by providing shade and through transpiration, an air conditioning effect. This cooling impact can help alleviate the urban heat island effect. Trees also provide important habitat and improve air quality by removing fine particles from the air. Leaf canopies also reduce erosion caused by heavy rain. The heat island effect in many new developments is exacerbated by the removal of trees and the sheer volume of bitumen, concrete, brick and dark roof tiles that absorb the heat and run the risk of making them unlivable as global temperatures continue to rise.

Heatwaves are deadly, in Australia, heat accounts for more deaths than all other natural disasters combined. Increasing green spaces, ensuring bus stops and parks are adequately shaded, and providing affordable access to air conditioning are all important measures that have been identified but an increase in tree canopy is vital. The Victorian government recognizes the heat island issue. "Our goal is to plant 3000 trees in Melbourne every year to increase the resilience of the urban forest and to cool our city by 4°C."2 It is also pleasing to see initiatives such as Greening the West. "A core driver for Greening the West is improving community health and wellbeing."3

For a solution, we can't look back. The quarter acre block (1011.7 m2) with a yard big enough to kick a footy or play cricket will increasingly become a rarity. The average new house allotment in Australia is down to 467 m2. We need higher density housing in appropriate locations, clever house designs, green spaces, urban forests and shady, tree lined streets to maintain the livability of our suburbs and towns.

Environment News

Winter sustainability tips

Winter can often mean a spike in our energy usage – heaters running a little longer or spending a few extra minutes in that hot shower. It can all add up to high energy usage and unfortunately higher bills.

Here are some tips to help you keep warm during those colder months while helping the environment and keeping those bills down:

Let the light in

If the sun is shining, open the curtains and blinds to let that valuable warmth in. This means less energy is needed when we turn our heaters on during the evening. Just remember to close those curtains once the sun disappears.

If your gas heater is on its last legs, start researching energy efficient electric alternatives so you're ready to make the switch.

Keep the heat in

Block door draughts with door snakes, use thermal film or secondary

glazing to create retrofitted double glazing, or simply close doors to unused rooms to help retain warmth in the areas that are being used in your home. We can lose up to 25 per cent of our heat to door draughts and almost 40 per cent to windows.

Stay within the limits

You can save money by having a programmable thermostat. Keep the internal temperature of your heating set to between 18°C and 20°C. Every degree you increase your heating can add up to 10 per cent on your energy use.

Get cosy

Have a cosy blanket on hand before you crank up your heater. Remember, every degree increase counts to higher bills.

Feeling the cold? So is your water meter, so keep it cozy.



Did you know your water meter can freeze in very cold temperatures? Luckily, Greater Western Water has the tips you need to keep your water flowing throughout winter.

The secret is to keep your meter covered. That traps the air inside and stops the water from freezing, so cover it with a blanket, container or bucket.

Cover any pipes above the ground too. Most hardware stores sell materials that work well as pipe insulation.

Otherwise, when the temperature drops below zero, your meter or pipes could freeze, leaving you without water or with split pipes.

Make sure anything you put on can be easily removed, so your meter can be read and maintained properly.

If your meter freezes, just wait. It thaws naturally as the temperature rises. This is the best way to avoid damaging anything.

If you can't wait, pour lukewarm water over the frozen area. Don't use hot or boiling water as that can damage the pipes.

If your water meter splits or breaks, call Greater Western Water on 13 44 99 to arrange a replacement.

Cheaper Regional Fares Saving Victorians Millions

Victorians saved millions of dollars on public transport fares last month after the Andrews Labor Government's regional fare cap came into effect, transforming the way people travel across the state.

Passengers have saved more than \$4 million since the cheaper fares were introduced on March 31, with the average V/Line passengers paying 50 per cent less for their trip. More than 1.5 million people took a trip on public transport across regional Victoria in the first month of the new fairer fares, including over 210,000 passengers on Bendigo line.

The first week alone saw more than 420, 000 passengers travel across the state, making it the busiest week on the network since before the COVID-19 pandemic. V/Line patronage data shows more passengers are taking advantage of cheaper fares to travel to and from major events like the Grand Prix, AFL matches and Groovin' the Moo, as well as tourism destinations across Victoria, with an uplift in patronage on weekend and special services.

Daily fares are now capped at the current metropolitan fare of \$9.20 or \$4.60 concession, while on weekends or public holidays, fares are capped at \$6.70 for a full fare of \$3.35 for concession per day. As Victorians continue to embrace travel on V/Line thanks to the fairer fares, the

Labor Government will upgrade and boost the regional public transport network, including progressively adding new trains and more services to the network.

Since 2014, an extra 800 V/Line train services have also been added – with a record 2,200 regional train services now operating every week. Almost 200 extra weekend services are set to be added to the V/Line timetable from 2024 – with a further order of 23 VLocity trains to meet the demands of a growing network.



Environment Group - Dung Beetle Excursion

On Monday 8th May the Environment Group travelled to Midhill Vineyard in Romsey to learn about and search for Dung Beetles. Hugh and Di from Midhill Vineyard are very well informed about dung beetles and were more than happy to share their knowledge with us and for us to visit their vineyard and search for dung beetles. Learning about the Dung Beetle fits in with our Earthwatch Kids Teaching Kids topic of the importance of insects for biodiversity. We have decided to make Dung Beetles our main focus as they are such an interesting insect who play a significant role in agriculture and our ecosystem. The students learnt about what the Dung Beetle does, how vital they are to the soil and the environment and what to look for in a cow pat to see whether dung beetles are active. Dung Beetles are useful ecosystem engineers because they bury the dung of livestock. This means it is not lying around in paddocks, which reduces the number of parasite eggs and pasture fouling. If buried, the dung also becomes a natural fertiliser which supports pasture growth and soil health and can prevent nutrients from the dung polluting waterways.

After we'd found out some information and observed a couple of live dung beetles that Hugh & Di had dug up earlier, we went searching through the paddock for cow dung, looking for the telltale signs of holes. We then proceeded to dig up the dung to see if we could find the

dung beetles. We had a very successful afternoon, the students were so engaged, they had a wonderful time. Who knew you could have so much fun with cow dung!! We found many dung beetles, lots of Onthophagus taurus (Bullhorned dung beetle) and one Onthophagus vacca which our hosts were very excited about! We collected all the dung beetles we caught and Hugh and Di said they would let them loose with the cows in the next paddock.

Over the coming weeks we will be learning more and more about the dung beetle as we prepare for the KTK Conference in Term Three. We thank Hugh and Di for their time and the wonderful opportunity to learn about and see dung beetles.

Encourage Church is an amazing church (yes, I am biased), so this month I am going to describe who we are and some of the things we do.







HOME HINTS FROM HERALD SUN - January 1995

- Charcoal pieces mixed with soil at the base of plant pots keep soil sweet and help with drainage.
- You can boil cracked eggs if you wrap them tightly in foil.
- To keep cauliflower white try adding a strip of lemon peel or two tablespoons of milk when cooking.
- Use celery tops as a basting brush when barbecuing.
- Onions are useful -if you get grit in your eyes chop an onion and let your tears wash it away.
- To brighten an aluminium pan, boil citrus peel in it.
- Rub lemon peel over your chopping board to clean and deodorise it.
- Stiffen the end of thread with hair spray to help thread a needle.
- To speed ripening of tomatoes, place in a paper bag with a banana. Pinch a few holes in the bag first.

| LOVE CANNOT WAIT Mark 3: 1-6

Again he entered the synagogue and a man was there who had a withered hand. They watched him to see if he would cure him on the sabbath, so that they might accuse him. And he said to the man "come forward". Then he said to them "Is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath, to save life or to kill"? But they were silent. He looked at them with anger, he was grieved at their hardness of heart and said to the man "stretch out your hand". He stretched out his hand and was restored. The Pharisees went out and conspired with the Herodians against him, how to destroy him.

The opposition now goes a stage further; they watch Jesus 'so that they might accuse him' (verse 2). The Sabbath law allowed acts of healing if there was an emergency, but clearly there was no emergency here - the man was not going to die suddenly because of a withered hand. Jesus had only to wait until the Sabbath ended at sunset and then healing the hand would be within the law.

Jesus knows that they are watching him, but love cannot wait. The rules may say 'Wait until sunset' but if this man has a need that Jesus can meet, then in his love he will do it now.

In 2:1 to 3: 6 Mark has incorporated a collection of stories of increasing opposition, which was probably put together before he wrote his gospel. When the story of the death of Christ was told, people would ask, 'Why was he crucified?' These stories give the answer that he was crucified because he would not be deterred from loving action. The cross is the climax of his life of love, love for ordinary people, love that would not be put off by threats of death. Jesus was crucified because he loved people, people like us.




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
