Preparations are finally underway for works to reconstruct a busy section of Murphy Street in Romsey, providing a safer, smoother journey for road users and better accessibility for pedestrians.

This area has seen increased activity since The 1860 opened.

Murphy Street will be upgraded between Main Street and Pohlman Street, with works to include:


- 130m of road pavement reconstruction
- roadside drainage improvements
- a new footpath on the northern side of Murphy Street.

Works will get underway in mid-March and be completed by the end of May 2024, weather permitting.


Traffic management, signage and detours will be in place during the works, with the relevant section of Murphy Street to be closed to vehicles. The service road along Main Street and the southern footpath on Murphy Street will remain open.

The contractor will work closely with directly impacted businesses and residents, to ensure access is maintained for deliveries/bin collections/property access as necessary.

# Over the years we have all seen the efforts by cigarette and tobacco manufacturers to dodge the issue that their products directly cause cancer.

Like the tobacco companies, many plastics manufacturing companies drew up campaigns to increase the sales of their products and to convince the public that all was well with single use plastics. It has been a hard-fought battle to get some minor changes in the plastics world. There was great "wailing and gnashing of teeth" from some sectors of the media and public when single-use shopping bags were withdrawn. Now very few are concerned, things are not a dire as predicted by the alarmists.

Just shows how easy it is to beat up a story and attack those looking for gradual change.

Big business often appears to not seem to care about the damage their products may cause and they do not seem to care about cleaning up the mess their products leave.

Victoria has now introduced a "Container Deposit Scheme" (SA did this in the early 1970s!) and the effects of this program are readily seen. Far fewer bottles, cans and plastic containers around the sports grounds, in the streets and across Romsey Park. This is a good thing. Let's hope that this scheme can be expanded to include all glass containers.

# March in the garden

The first signs indicating the turning of the seasons have begun. A few dead leaves fluttering around, lawns browning off (finally!) and tomatoes in full production. We have really only had a few very hot days, so part of me is still waiting for summer to begin! However autumn is a great time to plant and I am hoping that our landscaper will be here this week to move soil around, build retaining walls and spread gravel on the driveway. Then I can really get into the planting!

I took the chance to visit Stone Hill a beautiful hilltop garden in Woodend North last weekend. Apart from the gorgeous gravel garden and quarry garden designed and planted by Michael McCoy; I was surprised to see the water tanks completely covered with Boston Ivy (Parthenocissus tricuspidata). I'm often asked how to go about hiding a tank and this plant was doing a great job. Boston Ivy climbs/clings by using little sucker pads and the poly tanks were obviously providing a great surface for these. The tanks for completely covered and looked great! I have a smaller tank that needs covering and I think I might use the Sikkim creeper (Parthenocissus sikkimensis) which is similar but with smaller leaves which will better suit the scale of the area.





Lastly, I hope you can all get along to the Enviro Energy Expo in Riddells Creek on Saturday the 16th of March at the primary school in the afternoon. I will be there with a display on the gardens at the Riddells Creek Railway Station. These informal gardens have turned out to not only brighten the day for commuters; but are proving to be a great place for increased biodiversity with opportunities for planting indigenous plants being one of the future proposed projects.

# Make Your Own Cottage Cheese

# Cottage Cheese was obviously originally made in cottages.

King Alfred burnt his cakes, but it is said it was a travelling shepherd who first 'discovered' cheese in his camel's saddle bags which were made from sheeps' stomachs. He stored milk in his saddle bags which contained the digestive enzyme 'rennin'. He'd galloped his camel up and down the dunes before he stopped for drink of milk. The milk had become a crude cheese, which he gobbled down.

And so Cottage Cheese entered the world.

Europe fell in love with the easy-to-make (and eat) cheese. But it was the Americans who made the cheese in their cottages - so the 'Cottage' name stuck.

It's easy to make and cries out to have herbs and spices added to make the recipe your own. So here's a few ideas:-

First make your Cottage Cheese - it's quick and over-simple (only minutes to make, but it does need a resting time of about 15 to 20 hours - overnight, eh!). Also, I sometimes add, just before serving, a good sprinkle of dried oregano and dried garlic granules and/or finely chopped cooked chorizo sausage, which is stirred into the Cottage Cheese and then spooned onto a halved and peeled cooked (boiled) potato.

The following recipe will yield one cup or about 210 ml cheese.

Place a whole, unopened carton of buttermilk in a large, deep saucepan, fill the saucepan with water and boil gently for half an hour. Take the saucepan off the heat, pop on a lid and let it stand overnight (or about 15 to 20 hours).

Carefully lift the carton from the water, open it and pour the contents into a colander, discarding the clear whey which drains off the solids left in the colander. And there you have your home-made Cottage Cheese. Let it drain for a few minutes, add your own flavours then pop it into the fridge. It will keep for a few days.

# Bats - Managing the Quiet Achievers



#### Painting 20 bat nest boxes got me thinking about bats and nest boxes.

The over 1400 species of bats in the world - more than 80 in Australia - are fascinating yet poorly understood native mammal fauna. The small insect-eating bats, often called microbats, are rarely seen. Of the 23 insectivorous bat species in Victoria, 15 use tree hollows - only three use caves - as roosting and breeding sites.

Habitat destruction has affected forest dependent bats, restricting some to areas of native vegetation. Bats are vulnerable to cats when they fly low to the ground. No extinction of bats has been recorded in Victoria. Retaining living or dead trees with hollows is important – where these are insufficient, nest boxes for bats can work. Bats return to the same place each night and will return to the same roost after being gone for months or even years. Planting up areas with roosts helps long term, and planting under-storey and ground cover plants help bats foraging below the tree canopy.

Bats are flying mammals - they give birth to young that suckle milk from their mothers. Our microbats enter torpor from May to September, breed October to December. They



have one or two pups. To us, microbats seem silent, but they are actually noisy – their calls are pitched too high for us to hear. Their echo-location system allows them to navigate and capture prey in complete darkness. Study of bat echo-location resulted in technological advances like navigational radar and medical scanners.

Microbats are hard to see, as small as 3 grams and active at night. Dusk is a good time to spot them silhouetted against the sky. They can be spotted in trees, rock crevices, barns and rooftops. Insectivorous bats maintain the health of the rural environment, consuming half their body weight in insects each night - a natural pest controller.

Disturbance during torpor affects the bat's survival. Untrained people must never handle bats. If a dead one is found on your property, do not handle it directly. Using a spade, put it in a secure, leakproof container. Bats can carry a disease called Australian Bat Lyssavirus (ABLV) - related to the rabies virus and transmissible to humans. ABLV transmits by the saliva of infected bats, usually in bites or scratches. Flu-like symptoms appear within days, or up to several years afterward - headache, fever, weakness and fatigue. The illness progresses rapidly to paralysis, delirium, convulsions and death, usually within two weeks of symptom onset. There is no current cure.

If a bat enters your house; open doors and windows, switch off lights and fans and wait for it to find its way out! If bats are in your roof and you want them to leave, during the day tape a strip of plastic (like table cloth plastic over the top so it hangs down like a flap above the exit hole. Exiting bats drop down out of the exit. After they have gone, seal all entry points.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$30. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. # Veg on the Verge encourages residents to grow their own veggies on their doorstep



# Are you interested in establishing a small vegetable patch on your nature strip?

Macedon Ranges residents are being invited to take part in a pilot project to transform their verges into a productive and colourful space that is sure to be a feature of the neighbourhood.

The five lucky households will receive support to start their garden bed with access to information and resources as well as free locally sourced seedlings, equipment and one-on-one guidance and advice.

Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health is partnering with Healthy Loddon Campaspe and Macedon Ranges Shire Council on this exciting health and horticulture initiative which will help to inform Council's future review of their policy around verge gardening.

"Edible verge gardens are good for the environment, encourage people to be active and enjoy the outdoors plus they can help families incorporate more fresh produce into their diets," says Kylie Stafford from Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health who is coordinating the project in conjunction with Healthy Loddon Campaspe. "They can also help reduce the family food budget and promote a sense of community providing an opportunity for people to engage with their neighbours."

Macedon Ranges Shire Council Mayor Annette Death said it was important that people understood their

responsibilities – but also opportunities like this – that come with maintaining nature strips.

"Not everyone is aware that it is generally the responsibility of property owners to maintain their nature strips, but with that responsibility comes potential planting or landscaping opportunities through our Nature Strip Landscaping Policy," she said. "There are so many benefits of verge gardening, so we are keen to use the Veg on the Verge pilot project to help guide future decision-making around this topic."

As the sunset turned a fiery red just days ago, we were hauntingly reminded of the fragility of life. We were safe, but others were not.

Thankfully for us, the extreme fire rating for that day did not fulfil its fury. Alert but not alarmed, we went about the day, ensuring everyone was hydrated. Those made vulnerable by their health conditions were brought into air-conditioned comfort, as a keen eye was trained on the apps on our phones and a vigilant ear held to the radio.

Having in the past drawn the short straw on bushfire impact, we know the devastation this can unleash, as our thoughts sat with those impacted – be the impact direct or potentially

so. The waiting is always the hardest part, as one sits in that most anxious of zones, on tenterhooks, waiting and asking of the universe, "Are we next?" as one prays the answer to be delivered is "No. Not this time."

But no one walks away untouched.

For each in their own way are touched by a reassessment of life: what it means to be alive; a gratitude for such simple things as fresh air, untinged by smoke, sadness and despair; and a newfound appreciation for what is important in this world.

#### Harmony.

In instances such as these we find the greatest of our humanity coming to the fore to achieve this. Such as the emergency services responders (God bless your kind hearts and thank you for your efforts to keep us all safe), friends and even complete strangers reaching out to see if one is okay. And un-caped heroes acting in an instant wherever they may to help their fellow travellers on this planet: BlazeAid comes to mind – these kind crusaders sprang out of the Black Saturday tragedy here in Victoria to help those in need re-fence properties and more. But there are the lesser known heroes as well, such as those removing fallen trees blocking roads, enabling everyone to get home safely – this is a nod to the kind folk who did this on the Woodend–Romsey Road last Tuesday, an eclectic group of folk, who (previously unknown to the other) worked in perfect harmony, grabbing chainsaws and tow ropes from their vehicles and clearing the path for us all. And then we have the generous souls who selflessly work preparing meals, getting clothing together and ensuring comfort for those who have lost much (but never hope). The list is as endless as those touched by it all.

And as we peered into the redness of that fiery sunset, set ablaze by tragedy, we saw a spark of beauty in all as a gentle sheep wandered into view. How poignant, her name was Harmony. A sheep who, some may say, has been struck down by adversity, yet she's having none of that, daily choosing, over and over, to be herself and not defined by her circumstance.

Anyone who has met this sassy lass cannot help but be taken by her. "Inspirational" is a word that often comes to mind, along with "cheeky" and "cheery". And she, like that fiery sunset, shows us that life can gift us good things and bad things; it is what we do with them that counts.

And few things count more than having the courage and compassion to make peace with ourselves and strive to live in harmony.

# The Truth



What is THE TRUTH? According to the Oxford Dictionary, truth is that which is true, real, or actual.

One of the dangers we have as a society is that we let society define what truth is. It then becomes a majority rule, or the most powerful deciding the truth (remind anyone of the 'Ministry of Truth' in George Orwell's novel '1984'?).

When society's values and truth change over time, it means that the 'truth' of today, will not be the 'truth' of tomorrow, therefore the 'truth' of today is not 'truth'. Hmmm, so what can we rely on to be the truth?

It is a time to renew and deepen our faith. It calls for generosity of spirit, compassion and graciousness towards each other.


