The event was initiated by Romsey Neighbourhood House and very well organised and supported.


A lot of groups are keen to find volunteers to join their ranks so give it some thought and expand your horizons.



JUNE IN THE GARDEN

We have just returned from a fortnight away in the caravan. We spent a few days each at Mallacoota, Eden and Merimbula. All places I have never really visited before. It was most enjoyable seeing a part of Australia with which I am not familiar.

A FEW PLACES I THOUGHT WERE WORTH MENTIONING WERE.

- The Croajingolong Centre Garden in Mallacoota.
 This is a new small garden between shops in the main street "for the enjoyment of locals and visitors".
 It featured some beautiful specimens of the silver tea-tree (Leptospermum brachyandrum). I have just planted several of these in my garden so it was great to see how beautiful they are when well grown. We spotted a whip bird there!
- The Mallacoota Endemic Garden outside the Parks Victoria office. The sign said "insurance for the most vulnerable". A botanic garden of over 100 rare or endangered local plants from a variety of plant communities. "The project aims to build a garden of reflection and a place for the community to be immersed in the remarkable and diverse flora of far eastern Victoria and the southern NSW coast and hinterland."
- The Cabbage Tree Creek Flora Reserve between Marlo and Orbost.

The southernmost stand of the Cabbage Palm (Livistona australis) with only about 100 plants in the small reserve. Almost 180kms from its nearest relatives north of Bega in NSW! The access road was shocking but was about to be resurfaced. We spent a magical hour wandering through the reserve spotting juvenile, mature and ancient palms soaring way above our heads.

Next month I will fill you in on the completion of our new garden. Its great to be able to walk around the house without twisting an ankle! I have begun putting in a lot of the plants I bought with me from my old garden. They must be breathing a sigh of relief at finally getting in the ground!

Editorial June

Over the years the Woodend/Romsey Road has seen many people, out of their cars with hazard lights flashing and the drivers on the road shepherding an echidna, koala or other small native animals to safety.

The wide variety of native wildlife that inhabits that area is quite astounding and something that we should all be proud of and do all we can to protect and preserve.

Much of that road is now "fenced" in with Armco Railing to protect vehicles from running off the road and while a long section is 80Kph the speed signs are often knocked over or no longer in place. Perhaps more permanent signage could be installed to clearly indicate the speed restrictions.

These railings also make it very difficult for animals to cross the road or to get off the road when a vehicle comes along. As a result there is a very high animal fatality rate through that picturesque area.

Many animals, especially wombats, have consistent routes they travel, others have less consistent travel plans. The knowledge and skills exist to design and build safer animal crossings to help reduce the damage to vehicles and the death/serious injury to our precious native animals. Some crossings could be tunnels under the road others climbing wires/ropes slung between tall poles or trees. Many areas within Australia already have these safer animal crossings.

As our town grows, we want everyone to be both aware of, and appreciative of, these beautiful creatures.



OUR CONTINUING SERIES ON NOTABLE BUILDINGS IN ROMSEY

Union Hotel 143-145 Main Street

Now a private residence

The land on which the former Union Hotel was built was first purchased for the sum of £60 in 1856 by Owen Doolan, who sold it to William J Smith in the same year. William Smith was born in London in August 1823.



When William was just a boy, he lost his father in an unfortunate accident when the horse he was driving in a gig jumped a five-barred gate. Soon after this accident William started his apprenticeship as a farmer. William arrived in Melbourne in 1844.

It is thought that he must have arrived with a bit of funds with him as he ran horses on Melbourne's first racetrack close to the Village Belle Hotel in St Kilda. William was a notable story-teller and in the year of his death, 1912, the Romsey Examiner published some of his reminiscences titled, 'Tales of a Veteran'. William sold the corner lot with his house, possibly the second or third house built in the town, (after Seymour Cottage) to William McKinnon for a muchincreased price of £400. William McKinnon built the Union Hotel next door to the Smith house and opened the hotel on the 15th of April 1862. Six years later William McKinnon sold the lot to Neil McInnes for £750. The Union Hotel was delicensed on the 31st of December 1914.

Both William Smith's house and the Union Hotel are now private homes. They still retain most of their original external features and are considered to be historically significant. The Victorian Gazetteer of 1865 cited the hotel along with the Royal Mail and Romsey (now named The 1860) as important sites in what was described as '...a small road board postal village...' located on the road to Bendigo. The former Union Hotel was also a regular stopping place for Cobb & Co. Coaches.

The Following Matters Were Considered and Endorsed at the April 2024 Council Meeting:

RECURRING GRANT PROGRAMS: Updates to Council's Community Grants Policy were endorsed, in addition to guidelines for the next iteration of several recurring Council grant programs for *2024-25* including Events & Festivals, Community Funding Scheme and Small Project Grants.

In the 2023-24 financial year, close to \$300,000 was provided across 49 successful applications through these three key grant programs alone, supporting community groups to organise grassroots events, deliver infrastructure upgrades and provide resources to achieve their goals.

In 2024-25, these grant programs will continue alongside annual Australia Day Grants, Environment Support Group Grants and the Neighbourhood House Funding Program, with the latter consistent with the updated Neighbourhood House Policy endorsed at the March 2024 Council Meeting.

More information on each grant stream and criteria for 2024-25 will be provided on Council's website.

ROMSEY ELECTRONIC GAMING MACHINE APPLICATION: In considering an independent Social and Economic Impact Assessment (SEIA) and community feedback, Council endorsed a submission to the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC) opposing the application for 50 electronic gaming machines at 90-94 Main Street in Romsey (Romsey Hotel).

IN CONSIDERING THE SUBMISSION, COUNCIL NOTED THAT:

- the SEIA outlining that the proposal would have a net detriment of 0.66 on the wellbeing of the community under the 'no net detriment test' (a result below 1 (<1) indicates no detriment has been concluded)
- a community survey commissioned by Council conducted by an independent company received 1493 responses, with 60.36 per cent of respondents believing 50 electronic gaming machines in the Romsey township would have a negative impact on the broader community and 59.93 per cent of respondents not supporting the application.

The VGCCC will consider the application – including Council's submission – at a hearing commencing 21 May 2024.

2023-24 CAPITAL WORKS CARRY FORWARDS: Council endorsed that 38 projects be carried forward to the 2024-25 Budget for progression, ensuring funding surety for the delivery of a range of essential projects or for ongoing planning work.

Projects are carried forward for a variety of reasons including to correspond with external grant applications, to adapt to changes in market conditions, or to manage the projects spanning across multiple years to better line up with other work being completed by Council or externally.

SPECIAL CHARGE SCHEME: Council adopted an updated Special Charge Scheme (SCS) for Infrastructure Works Policy to better guide future infrastructure projects such as resident-funded upgrading of roads and drainage, following a period of community consultation in February this year.

The Policy outlines the decision-making process and criteria for SCS projects where providing these services or infrastructure items is deemed to provide a special benefit to property owners or certain community members. The policy has also been streamlined to speed up the decision process and eliminate repetitive resident surveying.

Council received one submission on the draft Policy during community consultation, which was responded to and outlined in the Agenda report. No changes were made to the Policy as a result.

Edgar's Mission Celebrates 21 Years of Kindness

Edgar's Mission, a sanctuary for rescued farmed animals in Lancefield, has recently celebrated 21 years of animal rescue and advocacy.

A beacon of hope in a world that is often dark for farm animals, Edgar's Mission is a place where those forgotten, abused, and abandoned can have lives truly worth living. Set on 153 peaceable acres in Lancefield, 60 km north of Melbourne, the sanctuary currently provides lifelong love and care to more than 400 residents and has rescued, rehabilitated and rehomed over 5000 animals – and it all started with a girl, a pig and a dream.

In 2003, Edgar Alan Pig trotted into the life of founder Pam Ahern, a quirky idea for a photo shoot with James Cromwell to raise awareness about the plight of these much-maligned animals, and took her in a direction that she never imagined.

"It was from watching people's interactions with Edgar that got me thinking the best ambassadors, the very best ambassadors for changing the way people think about these animals, were the animals themselves."

The sanctuary also relies on kind-hearted donors to provide emergency rescue, veterinary care and permanent loving homes for animals in need, without which the life-saving work of Edgar's Mission would not be possible. And 21 years on, the sanctuary has become known for taking on the sometimes deemed 'impossible' cases of neglected animals with extremely dire health conditions.

Just two weeks ago, we rescued a dorper ram lamb. He was critically emaciated, unable to stand or even lift his head, and had a worm burden that rivalled anything we had ever seen. But aided by a blood transfusion, an army of kindness, and round the clock care from our team, his fighting spirit has seen him take his first steps. It's in these moments you witness the magic of kindness," -PAM.

This year alone, we have rescued over 100 animals, rehomed more than 50 and fielded almost 200 calls from the community for assistance, and it is thanks to the support of our donors that we can provide this level of specialised care to animals in need."

Visitors can book Sanctuary tours (running between September-May each year) to see the sanctuary first-hand, learn and hear stories of the animal residents. Edgar's Mission will also launch a new school holiday program for kids aged 6-12 in July this year.

For those looking to spend more time at the sanctuary, they can enjoy the ultimate retreat with a stay at one of the Edgar's Mission tiny houses, overlooking the rolling hills and rescued animals of the sanctuary.

Up the Road from Tumut NSW is Talbingo

The Blowering Dam, once completed to form the last of the great Snowy Mountains Hydro Scheme, also completed the life of Talbingo - or the original Talbingo that is - for, you see, they moved the town.

Actually, Talbingo was a pub sitting beside a narrow strip of bitumen. The region was home to the Talbingo sheep and cattle station and various other smaller spreads including Mummy and Daddy Doyle's, where I spent a happy part of my young growing-up years with them.

Now Talbingo, sitting comfortably at the base of Mt. Talbingo, has a swag of new (comparatively) homes and families and shops etc. which cater for the passing travellers (on their way to the Yarangobilly Caves, or Canberra beyond the Brindabellas which were Miles Franklin's playground).

Anyway, before the pub was flooded, it was home to the publican and his family and a large, grumpy old pig. The pig was unceremoniously shot by the publican who mistook it for a mischievous intruder who'd been stealing from his vegetable garden. (It's a fun story of mishap, misadventure and mistake, but must be told another time.). Suffice to say, once shot, the pig graced the pub's dining room tables for some time to come.

During this time, in Fitzroy Street, Tumut, there lived the Shai-Hees - a Chinese family who ran a grocery shop. And being Chinese they liked Pork. And they cooked it in all manner of ways. One being, if my memory is correct, similar to the one I'm sharing with you today.

You see, the Shai-Hees got wind of the surplus of pig meat in the Talbingo pub's kitchen and so traded some grocery items for large portions of pig flesh.

By the way, you may be interested to know that when cleaning the above-mentioned pig, the publican found in the stomach of the deceased, the tin whistle that Billy Morris lost as he fell from the pub's balcony after entertaining the bar with his version of 'Foo as the Noo'.



SPICED TALBINGO PORK WITH GREENS

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons mirin
- 1 tablespoon sesame oil
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar

- 1 teaspoon Chinese
 Five Spice powder
- 4 star anise
- 1 tablespoon finely grated fresh ginger
- 2 small pork loin fillets (about 500 q)
- 1.5 kg Bok Choy.

METHOD

- 1. Put the soy sauce, mirin, sesame oil, garlic, brown sugar, Chinese Five Spice powder, star anise and ginger in a large bowl and stir. The sugar will dissolve. Add the pork marinate for at least an hour.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180 deg.C. Meanwhile, heat a non-stick frying pan over high heat and add the pork. Sear on both sides, transfer to a baking tray and bake for about 10 minutes.
- 3. Pour the remaining marinade into the frying pan with 1/2 cup of water, bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 3 minutes.
- 4. Warm the bok choy, remove the pork from the oven and serve thin slices of pork with the warmed greens and some boiled rice and sauce. (Don't chew the star anise.) Serves 4 people.

Availability for Children's Allied Health Services

Appointments are available for families whose children need speech therapy, physiotherapy or occupational therapy. Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health has re-opened its books with some services being available immediately.

The organisation is NDIS registered and has sites in Romsey, Sunbury and Kyneton.

Sunbury and Cobaw's allied health clinicians see children aged up to 10 years old for their physiotherapy service, and up to eight years old for speech and occupational therapy.

Families do not require a referral. You can call them on 5421 1666 and a staff member will run through the referral process with you.

For families who have concerns about the development of their baby or pre-school child, Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health also runs free drop-in sessions where parents and carers can come along with their child and have a chat to one of the child and youth health team. The sessions are held in venues across the Macedon Ranges and Sunbury.

Water: Where to from Here?



Some rivers have mandated entitlements to water for the environment - but not the Maribyrnong.

Our creeks have barely enough water to stay alive; to sustain populations of the endangered Yarra Pigmy Perch and to allow the return of Platypi along their reaches. It was with these sorts of issues and questions in mind (and many others relating to water treatment/recycling/stormwater etc) that the Macedon Water Think Tank was conceived a year ago and has met monthly since. It is an alliance of community members, including Deep Creek Landcare Group, who want to give informed opinion on policies, investment and services in the water space. The Think Tank has worked with Greater Western Water; they have been open with us, keen to pass on important information and have helped us gain access to water experts and important knowledge.

The Think Tank meeting in June will set an agenda for our communities for learning about water over the next two years. It will be held June 4 from 9.30 until 2.00 at the Global Learning Centre in Sunbury. Please go to Humanitix to register so we cater for lunch.

Where does our water come from? How is our water supply managed? Growing population, climate change – what are the implications for our water supply? Just some of the questions we face, along with fellow Victorians across the state and in fact, right across Australia.

At times, we source some of our supply from Melbourne Water. At present, most of our water is sourced locally. For Lancefield this means from surface water collected in the Garden Hut Reservoir on Garden Hut Creek, ground water bores near Lancefield and surface water collected by the Rosslynne (*Bullengarook*) and Kerrie Reservoirs. The current policy is to augment Lancefield's supply from Garden Hut with bore water and water from the other reservoirs when the Garden Hut Reservoir falls below 70% of its capacity. Romsey also has bores and is supplied water from the Rosslynne and Kerrie reservoirs.

Are the current practices sustainable? Extractions from our local creeks and the use of groundwater are an important part of our water supply but at what cost and for how much longer? Garden Hut Creek is in the headwaters of Deep Creek and does not flow year-round. It typically dries up into water holes over summer and often well into autumn and, as such, for much of the year, the reservoir takes important water from the delicate ecosystem that has developed along the creek over millennia. At times water has been extracted until the reservoir is empty, with devastating impacts on fish and invertebrates. It is a low-cost source for Lancefield's drinking water; and environmental impacts aren't in the frame. Drawdown of the reservoir significantly extends the time that Garden Hut Creek does not flow below the reservoir, and major drawdowns significantly disrupt aquatic life.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$30. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. Did you know textiles don't belong in your yellow-lidded recycling bin?

Any items that are damaged and can't be donated can be dropped off at your local resource recovery facility. Ask a staff member to point you in the direction of the textile recovery chutes.

Environmental health updates

Wood Smoke and Air Quality

As the weather becomes cooler and the leaves begin to fall, Council sees an increase in wood smoke complaints across the Macedon Ranges. Many residents rely on wood heaters and internal fireplaces for internal warmth during autumn and winter.

The smoke generated from wood heaters and fireplaces can pollute the air we breathe in and consequently be harmful to our health.

It is important that consumers purchase the right wood heater and then use and maintain it correctly to ensure that the wood smoke pollution is reduced.

The Environment Protection Agency (EPA) also recommends that you:

- always use dry, seasoned, untreated hardwood in your wood heater
- leave about two centimetres of ash at the base of your wood heater
- make sure your flue is clean.

If you are concerned about smoke from a neighbour's wood heater, it is recommended you try talking to them first. If this doesn't help, you can report the wood smoke pollution to Council by calling 5422 0333.

Septic Tanks or Onsite Wastewater Management Systems (OWMS)

Council is responsible for the assessment and approval of permits for septic tank systems within the shire.

Septic Tank Systems or Onsite Wastewater Management Systems (OWMS) are used on residential, community and business premises in unsewered areas. They treat, recycle or dispose of raw sewage. Raw sewage contains harmful bacteria and is commonly a combination of wastewater from toilets, bathrooms and kitchens.

There are laws that apply to the owner or occupier (i.e. a renter) of land with an OWMS. The system must be properly installed, operated and maintained, to ensure there are no public health risks arising from raw sewage.

Permits are issued by Council where someone wishes to construct, install, or alter an existing OWMS. Council is responsible for issuing permits for smaller-scale systems with a design or actual flow rate of sewage not more than 5000L on any day. A system that is larger than 5000L is approved by the Environment Protection Authority (EPA).

Our permit system includes desktop assessments, Land Capability Assessments (*LCAs*), multiple site visits and liaison with the plumber and or owner of the land. Council's planning team is also consulted to ensure they are also satisfied with the proposal prior to permits being issued.

ROMSEY LANCEFIELD ROTARY CLUB INC

On the 16th of May 2024 our guest speaker was Michael Garnett *(OA)* who has sponsored a small plaque on the Avenue of Honour together with his brother Gerald Garnett of Berkshire England commemorating the Malayan Emergency *1948-1960* and the effectiveness of the Avro-Lincoln bomber.



Michael was born in Essex, England and was a member of the Framlingham College – Combined Cadet Force in Suffolk. In 1956 he commenced his National Service with the Royal Air Force and was posted to the Far East Air Force (as it was titled at the time) that consisted of British, Australian and New Zealand squadrons. He and his brother Gerald were stationed at RAF Station Tengah No 1 Squadron RAAF and crewed the Avro-Lincoln bomber during the Malayan Emergency fighting guerillas of the Malay Communist Party.

After this period Michael managed tea plantations in North-East India and coconut plantations in Papua New Guinea before settling for good in Australia and then employed by the oil industry.

He later joined the City of Melbourne N0 21 Squadron as a reserve officer based at RAAF Laverton (Melbourne). Michael lives in Romsey, takes an active part in the RSL (especially Kyneton RSL sub-branch).

Michael is a prolific historical author and was in part responsible for the establishment of the Romsey Fountain (outside the Romsey Mechanic's Institute) in 2001 to commemorate the Centenary of Federation. He has been a keen player in Royal Tennis and published a book in 1983, titled A History of Royal Tennis in Australia.

Michael regaled to the Rotarians his experiences growing up in England after the war and his many exploits around the world.

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR TIM

UNFORGIVENESS

Everyone has been wronged by someone else. Whether through words or actions, someone has hurt us. When this happens, if we let resentment or anger build up – we end up holding unforgiveness towards the other person.

"Forgive" according to the Oxford Languages dictionary is to "stop feeling angry or resentful towards (someone) for an offence, flaw, or mistake". Studies have shown that forgiving someone can have a major impact on your mental wellbeing and physical health. Words such as "reap huge rewards", "powerful health benefits" and "significantly improve" were words used to describe the impact.

The opposite is true too - holding onto unforgiveness towards someone can lead to negative impacts on our mental wellbeing and physical health. As Marianne Williamson, an American author says: "unforgiveness is like drinking poison yourself and waiting for the other person to die".

Note that forgiving someone is something that happens inside of you. It is a choice that you make to stop those negative thoughts towards the other person for something that they have done to you. Also note that forgiveness is different to justice, it doesn't necessarily mean that there will be or needs to be reconciliation, it is not a sign of weakness as it actually takes more strength to forgive than to hold onto the grudge, it doesn't mean that you forget what happened to you as there are just some things you cannot forget, and it doesn't mean you put yourself back into a vulnerable situation.

BE GENTLE AND READY TO FORGIVE; NEVER HOLD GRUDGES. REMEMBER, THE LORD FORGAVE YOU, SO YOU MUST FORGIVE OTHERS. COLOSSIANS 3:13 (Living Bible)

Self-sufficiency: As an incorporated body, we are responsible for our own management as part of the Romsey Community. Members also work on community-based activities. Donations of tools, machines and various materials have been very helpful in getting us viable, as funding is always an issue in a volunteer organisation.

Membership Fees: Our membership fees are kept at a minimum and mainly cover mandatory outgoings like insurance and utility services.

Tuesdays: Open 9 to 4 for coffee, chat and hobby work for the "hands-on" men.

Wednesday open times: The Woodwork group gather on Wednesdays. Open times depend on their projects, but are usually 9am - 1pm.

Thursday \$5 **BBQ/Light lunch day:** The Thursday \$5 barbeque/light lunch at 12 is well attended. Members guests and men interested in discussing joining, are welcome. 9⁻³⁰ am to about 2pm is the usual Thursday operating time. Occasionally we have a guest speaker. And about three times a year we shut up and go to local restaurant venues, part funded by the weekly "*Pub-style meat raffle*".

Future expansion: We are negotiating with Macedon Ranges Shire Council for pre-approvals to expand our Crown Land lease. We have a Building Fund, but will need a significant external grant to proceed.
