

AUGUST IN THE GARDEN

We have escaped Victoria's cold and are currently enjoying the weak winter sun on Queensland's coast! I am enjoying the changing scenery from eucalypts and wattles one minute to Bangalow palms and giant bird-of-paradise the next! We have also been visiting different botanic gardens and significant trees along the way.

The one thing I have noticed is the change of weeds beside the road. We have gone from blackberries to lantana, thistles to giant devil's fig and gorse to tree tobacco. I learned at Burnley that a weed is 'a plant out of place'. What you love and struggle to keep alive might be a curse in another climate. I was amazed to find a specimen of the coral berry in the subtropical rainforest west of Brisbane. Ardisia crenata is sold in Victoria as an indoor plant and I have always admired its glossy green leaves and bunches of bright red berries. However, in the sub-tropics this plants shades out native seedlings thereby inhibiting regeneration of native plants. We have also been tracking down trees on the significant tree register and were awed by a visit to a clump of three Antarctic Beech trees (Nothofagus moorei) near the Gold Coast which have been dated to about 2000 years old. How amazing is that? I think that's the oldest living thing I have ever seen. With moss covered, gnarled and contorted trunks they were a truly wondrous sight. We were also privileged to hear the rare Albert's lyrebird give a performance for 10 minutes while we stood beneath the rainforest canopy with breath held.

Artworks to Celebrate Significant Victorian Women

The Allan Labor Government is celebrating the role of women across Victoria with a new round of the Women's Public Art Program – to install six new public artworks honouring remarkable women.

Minister for Women Natalie Hutchins recently opened applications for the next round of the program. Of the almost 600 statues across Melbourne's public spaces, only around two per cent represent women, with most statues representing men or animals.

That's why the Labor Government is working to shift the dial on the public representation of women, investing a further \$1.2 million into the second round of the landmark Women's Public Art Program.

Aboriginal women are often invisible in public artworks, and this NAIDOC Week Aunty Pam Pedersen is highlighting the opportunity to recognise Aboriginal women through public art such as the sculpture of her mother, Lady Gladys Nicholls, at Parliament Gardens.




WOODEND HANGING ROCK PETANQUE CLUB

Hope everyone is keeping warm as winter has really hit with these cold days, thought we would put in a recipe for these chilly days and nights.

COTTAGE PIE SERVES 4

INGREDIENTS

- 1 kg mince 1 tablespoon oil
- 2 onions chopped 1 ½ tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 tablespoon gravy powder 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 1 cup water salt and pepper to taste
- Grated parmesan for sprinkling chopped parsley to garnish
- Topping
- 1.5kg potatoes cooked and mashed add ½ cup milk and dollop of butter to mash.

METHOD

- 1. In a large saucepan brown the mince in oil over med heat, stirring breaking up the mince. Add onions cook for 5 mins until soft add the tom paste, gravy powder and curry powder water and salt and pepper. Stir well cover and simmer for 15 mins add little more water if looks to dry.
- 2. Mash the potatoes with milk and butter.
- 3. Place the mince mixture into a casserole dish top with mashed potato, sprinkle on the parmesan.
- 4. Bake in mod oven 180c until browned on top. 30-40 mins.
- 5. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.



COOKING WITH PETER RUSSELL-CLARKE

G'DAY,

"Nuts to you, too!" An American expression not used in Australia as often as 'Stone the crows!" or "Starve the lizards!"

And nuts aren't eaten as often as I believe they should be.

Instead of snacking on milk chocolate (dark chocolate is OK, as long as you only eat one or two squares of it daily, and those squares contain at least 60% cocoa) - but back to nuts. As a general rule, nuts contain protein, omega and fatty acids, vitamin E, potassium, calcium, iron, magnesium, zinc and selenium - different varieties of nuts contain different amounts of the goodies! Therefore it's not a bad idea to buy mixed nuts - many varieties and mix them yourself.

Anyway, here's an idea which I've put together which I think is goodoh. And not just for snacking. Try it with Natural Greek Yoghurt or just about anything else.



BLOODY GOOD NUTS, ETC.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 egg white
- 2 cups mixed nuts, such as Brazil nuts, walnuts, pecans and almonds
- 1/2 cup pepitas (pumpkin seeds)

- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries.

METHOD

 Lightly whisk the egg white in a large bowl then add the nuts and pumpkin seeds. Toss to coat them well then stir in the brown sugar, ginger and nutmeg. When all is blended well, stir in the cranberries.
 Spread the mixture over two ungreased baking trays then bake for about 20 minutes in the oven pre-heated to 180 deg.C.



Trees... They Need us and We Need Them

Our National Tree Planting Day on Sunday, July 28 reminds us of the importance of trees. Trees are vital to our ecosystems; they sustain the life of insects, reptiles, birds and other animals. They draw down on carbon, act as windbreaks and provide shelter and shade.



Since our inception in 1989 Deep Creek Landcare Group has planted thousands of indigenous trees, shrubs and grasses along our roads and waterways and private properties in our area around Lancefield, Romsey and Monegeetta. We are always on the lookout for opportunities to be "nature positive" by enhancing biodiversity.

If planting a significant number of trees, shrubs or grasses it is substantially cheaper to buy seedlings. DCLG is able to supply a range of local seedlings from \$35 per box of 48 plants, give expert advice regarding selection and planting and the availability of government grants. Orders need to be in by the end of September so that we can propagate from indigenous seeds supplied by The Tree Project.

As part of the Upper Deep Creek Landcare Network we are also involved in a couple of local biolink projects. Biolinks are areas of vegetation or habitat, such as waterways or paddock trees that form connections or wildlife corridors to enable fauna to move freely throughout the landscape to feed, breed and seek protection. Biolinks also contribute to the movement of plants through seed and pollen dispersal, leading to greater resilience and genetic diversity.

The Mount William Range Biolink and Deep Creek Biolink are two of six priority biolink areas identified in Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Biodiversity Strategy 2018. The Mount William Range Biolink Project aims to connect existing remnant vegetation along the Mount William range, through a combination of management actions. These actions include, but are not limited to, fencing, revegetation, pest, plant and animal control and installing nesting boxes. The Deep Creek Biolink project has similar objectives along Deep Creek.

On Friday, July 26 we celebrated School National Tree Day with Romsey P.S. We will be adding a range of small, local flowers to enhance the earlier plantings of local trees and shrubs along the southern boundary of the school. In addition, our Junior Landcare Facilitator (*Emma Stevens*) is organising a planting day at Lancefield Park with Lancefield P.S and St Marys P.S on Friday, September 13.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$30. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. Romsey Park wildlife

RGC Greens' Keeper, Steve "Sevi" Wilkins noticed a small bird on the ground below one of the older gum trees. He picked it up and took it home. Once home he and wife Sue, took it to Wildlife Care in Wallan. The bird was a Southern Bobook Owl. It had apparently flown into a branch and was concussed. A few days of TLC and Sevi and Sue were able to bring it home. The bird was released and flew quickly into one of the nearby trees. Sevi has since seen it and its pair ensconsed in a natural hollow in one of the Park's oldest trees. In recent years the club has built and installed over 30 nesting boxes. These are for smaller birds (*Tree Creepers, Striated & Pardalotes*) and smaller mammals such as the (*phascogales & antechinus*)

W. E. Tom 4BBB Shield

This shield is played during July and August, it is a team event. The qualifying round sees all pairs playing to get into the top eight. These eight pairs then play matchplay in the quarter and semi finals before the final on August 17th. It looks like the 2023 champions, Dylan Harris/Luke Lyons will not be able to defend the shield.

Short Course

In early July Elaine Scanlon, Darlene Baker, Anthony Lakey (*RGC*) and Tristian Zito (*GolfAus*) walked the course and organised the layout for a Yellow, Short Course. This course is Par 72 for men and women and is 3,846m long. It may sound an easy course but handicapping sees a player off 18 on the blue course off 6 on the yellow course, a player of 2 or 3 on the blue will be +6 on the Yellow Course. Golf is very aware that the world is changing and people do not always have four hours for a round of golf. This short course will allow players to play a round but have it over and done with in around two to two and a half hours. Our thanks to Paul Green, John Freestone and Trevor Turnham who have worked together to prepare the new Yellow Tee Markers.

Romsey Junior Football/Netball Vouchers

Every year, during school holidays, we have numerous younger people out on the course trying their hand at golf. All day golf for an U18 is only \$5.00. Our Greens' Keeper, Sevi, (and other club volunteers) often stop and talk with these junior golfers checking that they have paid and assisting with sand buckets and spare balls. Let's hope we have more of the town's young people out on the park, enjoying themselves, learning the game and seeing just how much work our volunteers put into keeping the course and Romsey Park in its best possible condition

Need Help Connecting with Services?

A free service is available to residents of the Macedon Ranges to help them with accessing government and other services. The service provides the opportunity for people to meet with someone in their home or another place where they feel comfortable, to discuss what support options are available to them to help improve their quality of life.

Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health's Connection Officer Carolyn Colson says that there can be many barriers to getting the help that you are eligible for.

"Often people are not aware of the funding or the services that are available to them, or they might be unsure how to go about connecting with a service. The barrier might be what they perceive as their lack of computer skills, or they might not feel confident picking up the phone."

Help might include contacting the National Disability Insurance Scheme, Centrelink or looking at what groups and programs might be available in the local area for people to join.

"There are so many ways people can enrich their lives, achieve greater independence, learn new skills and connect with others," says Carolyn. "I can help navigate what can be an overwhelming amount of information and together we can find the supports that a person wants and needs."

The service is open to people under the age of 65, or under 50 if you are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

If you're not an Australian citizen but pay rates to council, you own or occupy rateable property in Macedon Ranges Shire but do not live in the area, or you are a director or company secretary of a corporation that pays rates to council and have no other voting entitlements for this council, you can apply to become a council-enrolled voter. To find out more and to apply, contact Council on 5422 0333 and apply by 4 pm on Wednesday 7 August.

The Other John Laing

Everyone seems to know John William Laing, the 90-year-old gentleman, retired farmer, former Romsey Shire Councillor, Life Member of the Romsey Golf Club and loyal supporter of many associations within the Shire, that you could meet down the street in Romsey.



But it is his uncle, John Albert (*Jack*) Laing, born on 5th July 1884, who is the one featured in this article. Jack was the 9th of 10 children born to James and Elizabeth Laing, who farmed the "Glendale" property, (opposite "Woodlands") east of Romsey, that had been purchased by his father William when he moved from Melbourne to Springfield in the 1850's.

It was the Head Teacher of the small Springfield State School, who encouraged john as a student, describing him to his mother as "a very intelligent son with lots of promise." It was because of this recommendation and her insistence, that her 9th child was sent as a boarder to Scotch College to further his education.

As an athletic student John excelled academically and at sports. He thrived on the competitiveness and team-work required by rowing and football. In 1908 John played football for his team "University" in the VFL. Records reveal that he was 6 feet tall and 23 years 339 days olds when he played his first VFL match.

He graduated from Melbourne University with a Master of Civil Engineering degree and later specialised in precast reinforced concrete constructions. John married Eleanor Troutback on the 3rd January 1916 at Holy Trinity Church of England, East Melbourne.

At 51 years of age, his ability was recognised by his peers when, in 1935, they elected him as President of the Victorian Chapter of the Institute of Civil Engineers. His consultancy work involved the construction, of the Chapel St./Swan St. Bridge in 1924, the spires of St Paul's Cathedral, the Burke Rd. bridge in Kew, the design of the old State Theatre (*The Forum*) in Flinders Street Melbourne, which opened in 1929 with the largest seating capacity of any theatre in Australia.

John also consulted on the important constructions of the hotel Alexander, the AMP Building, the Australian Newspaper Mills at Boyer Tasmania, the Associated Pulp and Paper Mills at Burnie Tasmania.

For 10 years John was a specialist lecturer and Council Member of the University, the Faculty of Engineering, the Board of Management and the House and Buildings Committees of Prince Henry's Hospital. He was also a past Master of the Austral Temple Masonic Lodge and an active chairman of the Community Service Committee of Melbourne Rotary.

It is also of interest that Jack's youngest brother Robert (*Bob*), father of our John Laing, enlisted in 1915 and served at Gallipoli and in France where, at Bullecourt won the Military Medal and rose to the rank of Lieutenant.

At 60 years of age, John Albert Laing died suddenly at his home in Malvern. He continues to be remembered as a highly respected, talented man who encouraged others and maintained high standards. His life's story continues to inspire others.

Soft plastic recycling pilot

Did you know you can know collect your soft plastic in a special orange collection bag and pop it in your recycling bin?

Recently, Council launched a shire-wide soft plastic recycling program, allowing residents to recycle their soft plastic conveniently in their kerbside recycling bin.

All soft plastic items that carry the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) – Return to Store symbol or REDcycle logo are accepted in this trial.

If you'd like to participate, visit your nearest customer service centre to collect an information pack, which includes a letter and 20 orange collection bags.

If you don't want to use the special collection bags or aren't on Council's kerbside service, you can take your soft plastic to a Resource Recovery Facility for recycling.

The soft plastic collected in the pilot program will be sent to specialist processors in Victoria to make new plastic products locally, which supports our objectives to reduce waste to landfill, emissions and litter.

THE ROMSEY RAG, A HISTORY

In the early 1980's a photocopier was a rare luxury in primary schools and so Romsey local school news was conveyed in the weekly duplicated newsletter or in the only local paper based in Sunbury. Local contributions to that paper were often not printed at all or the heavily edited. There was clearly a need for a local newspaper.

Inspired by the "Wallan Whistle", a free community publication, it was decided that Mrs Barbara Rowlands, (a committee member of that group), should be invited to explain the operations to Trevor Turnham (Principal of Romsey Primary School) who together with Mrs Beryl Cole, Mrs Bev Large and Mrs Val Lobb formed the initial editorial/publishing committee undertaking responsibility for a duplicated news sheet which would become known, (following a suggestion from Mrs Lobb), as "The Romsey Rag". - Three sheets of A4 white paper printed on both sides. A very humble beginning for the now very widely distributed, important community newsletter that has been nurtured by successive groups of dedicated volunteers, who have ensured that the professional edition we now hold in our hands reflects our community.

A \$500 grant was made available for this purpose through the Education Department's "School Improvement Program" and so on the 15th of August 1994, using the black ink and Wax stencils on a Gestetner duplicator, the first Romsey Rag (marked "collector's copy") was published.

The first *Romsey Rags* were collated on Beryl Cole's kitchen table to be later delivered to letterboxes by members of the Uniting Church Youth Group.

The committee felt that *the Romsey Rag* should feature not only school news but also the activities of all groups in Romsey District. Articles solicited from local activity groups would be dropped off at Romsey Post office from where Beryl Cole would take them for typing.

Over the years many people have been involved in the typing, duplicating, collation and distribution of this ongoing, voluntarily produced community resource. In 1989 Mrs Margaret Howatson not only assisted with typing but also became involved with its sponsorship and advertising.

After Trevor Turnham retired in 1999, new principals included Barney Healy, Joan Gibbs provided encouragement and support as proof-readers and contributors. Once computers and word processing were introduced to the school, production became much simpler.

From 2015 the Primary school found itself unable to dedicate sufficient resources to the production of The Rag and in 2018 production was taken up by a separate community committee and their dramatically fresh approach resulted in the easily read, professionally presented publication that we now see both in print and on-line.

Road Closure

Finally, after many many years of trying we have secured the road closure of Raglan Street so that students can safely move around the school grounds without road safety concerns. During the term break fencing went up to secure the area. Raglan Street between Dunsford Street and Chauncey Street is now a NO THROUGH ROAD. There is no pedestrian access during school hours, but the gates will be open for access at the



end of the school day. This is a momentous occasion for St Mary's and we must thank Julie McDougall our former principal for all her hard work in making this happen, along with Mick McCarthy (School Advisory Board Chairperson) for his assistance and expertise. We would also like to acknowledge the generosity of Terraco - Civil Engineers, Project Managers, Development Consultants (https://www.terraco.com.au/) who donated their services in the design of the road closure works. We thank them for their kind donation. It's an exciting time as we now look at how we can make this a wonderful space for our students.

Favourite Beanie Day - Fight MND Fundraiser

On Friday 14th June we held a special fundraising event to help raise funds for Fight MND. Last year we were lucky enough to have Daniher's Drive visit St Mary's, which was such an amazing event for our school and at that time we pledged to continue the annual fundraising for this very important cause. This year we asked our students to wear their favourite beanie to school and bring in a gold coin donation. Mrs Kennedy fired up the 5/6 's by confirming that if they were able to raise \$50 in gold coins, she would take the ice bucket challenge! Well of course this fired everyone up! The Sports Captains came to see me and wanted to run another ice bucket relay like last year. So it was a quick run around on Thursday afternoon, confirming staff members to brave the ice bucket.

Of course everyone was in, so Team 1 consisted of our Sports Captains, Mason, Cohen, Edie, Millie, Harper G, Charlotte Mc, Pippa and Meg. Team 2 consisted of our great leader Mrs Agius, plus Mrs Giles, Mrs Awty, Miss Fisher and of course Mrs Kennedy. Our school leaders made up the 8, so we thank Emmett, Sophie and Ruby for also joining in.

We made sure each bucket was filled halfway with ice, then water (we had to be sure it was nice and cold!) and once we figured out how the relay worked (we got there eventually!) we were set to go.



Hilarity prevailed as each person was dually dumped with ice cold water, some even left the buckets on their teammates head. Lots of cheering and screaming from the rowdy crowd as the Sports Captains easily won the relay. A great event once again. We'd like to thank everyone who took part and of course everyone in our amazing community for their generous donations. A huge thank you to Liberty Service Station in Lancefield for donating the ice, a very generous donation that was greatly appreciated! We made a total of \$436.50 (\$205 raised by the 5/6 's alone!) which we then donated to Mrs Stevens MND fundraiser as she prepared to take the Big Freeze Slide as part of the RJFNC Big Freeze fundraiser on Sunday 16th June.

Congratulations to Mrs Stevens who not only took the plunge into very icy cold depths, but at last count raised over \$2500 for Fight MND. A magnificent effort.

Student Showcase of Learning

Term Two concluded with a 'Student Showcase of Learning'. Students from Prep - Six showcased the great work they produced during their Inquiry Learning throughout the term. The themes were;

Prep - 'How it Works' Students explored how the toys they play with work. They investigated ways objects move depending on size, shape and how forces (push or pull) influence how they are used.

Year 1/2 - 'Sharing the Planet' By learning about different places around the world students developed an understanding and appreciation of diverse locations and ways of life.

Year 3/4 - 'Sharing the Planet' Students developed a deepening awareness and appreciation of diverse environments and the interrelationship between living things. They learnt how humans can impact and utilise the Earth and its resources in responsible and sustainable ways.







Year 5/6 - 'How Animals have adapted to their Environment' Students developed an awareness of the cause and effect relationship between humans (and their impact) and the environment and the factors contributing to animal adaptations.

We had a huge turnout of family members join us to see all the wonderful learning and creative work on display by our very talented students. It was wonderful to see their enthusiasm and share in their learning experience. A massive congratulations to all of our students for their impressive displays, keep up the great work.

VIS ATHLETE VISIT

On Friday 14th of June, we had a visit from Reece Langdon who is a VIS (Victorian Institute of Sport) scholarship athlete. His event is the 1500m, and he is a para-athlete.

In December 2002 (age 6) Reece started getting severe headaches, so his parents took him to hospital. He soon lost his ability to talk and walk and became almost completely paralysed. They discovered he had severe streptococcal which led to a virus, which attacked his cerebellum. Reece was diagnosed with Cerebellitis. He gradually relearnt how to walk and talk, but was left with permanent ataxia, coordination impairment, temperature regulation issues, and general weakness on the left side of his body.

Reece spoke about his training, nutrition and also motivated students that if you want to succeed at something you must put in the hard work. He spoke very well and was very engaging for all those participating in the presentation.

He is a silver medallist at the 2023 World Championships and he will compete at the Paris Paralympics in September this year.

Reece is a true inspiration to all, and we wish him all the best when he competes for Australia.







Clothes, towels, linen and other textile items aren't accepted at the facilities that sort household recycling.

Consider giving away items that are in good condition, repurposing items that are damaged, or visiting a resource recovery facility to recycle textiles for free. If there's no other option, put them in your general rubbish bin.

A Welcome Sight, if You Are a Horse

ROMSEY'S 'BILLS WATER TROUGH' FOR HORSES C1930S



This small piece of local rural history is located in Romsey's Main Street western service lane nature strip near the entry to the IGA car park. Peter Mitchell in his Romsey book 'A Veritable Garden of Eden' records that during the 1930s this water trough for horses was donated to the Romsey Township by George and Annis Bills.

Seven hundreds of these horse troughs were placed around Australia mainly in Victoria and New South Wales during the 1930s. The troughs were pre-cast in concrete with a curved pediment with the inscription "Donated by Annis & George Bills Australia"

About 50 were also donated internationally, four of which survive in the UK. A rare Bills trough is in Tunbridge Wells others are in Englefield Green in northern Surrey, Hinckley Road in Leicester, and in Tilehurst, Reading.

George and Annis Bills had no children, and following the death of George in 1927, a trust fund was set up, believed to be around £70 to £80,000. One of the purposes of the trust, as set out in George Bills' will, was to:



"...construct and erect and pay for horse troughs wherever they may be of the opinion that such horse troughs are desirable for the relief of horses and other dumb animals either in Australasia, in the British Islands or in any other part of the world subject to the consent of the proper authorities being obtained...."

In the 1930s each trough cost around £13 plus more for transport and installation onsite to a water supply.

Initially the troughs were individually designed and constructed, however by the early 1930s, J.B. Phillips, a relative of the Bills, became the head contractor. Working to a standard design he pre-cast in concrete the troughs in a facility in Auburn Road Hawthorn. With the increase of the car and truck transport, demand for the troughs declined and production ceased around 1946.







