

We returned home in late August; just in time to see spring really start to arrive! The last of the daffodils was blooming, the leaf buds on the trees were starting to swell and the ornamental pears were already in flower. Our garden was in reasonable shape although littered with sticks, twigs and leaves. Must have been a few storms while we were away! In our big yellow gum; magpies have begun to build their nest. The first time we have had them nesting in our garden. Hope we don't get swooped!

The worst issue in the garden when we returned was the evidence of the rabbits! Everywhere small holes had been dug and some new plants had been chewed down to ground level. I spent the first weekend back endeavouring to rabbit-proof the garden. I installed more chicken wire up against the brand-new dividing fence through which I thought they could not pass. Our beautiful new gate unfortunately has a gap beneath; so I have stuffed it with rolled chicken wire which of course has to be removed every day - not a very satisfactory solution.



I planted some garlic and red onions in a raised vege pod before going away and as it is a water wicking system these have grown well. So has the row of blue sweet peas planted below the new trellis. I can't wait to see these bloom! My new greenhouse has a few things inside including two tomatoes potted into 140mm pots and awaiting the warmer weather to go outside in November. Other plants in there are also doing well. I love going in there to check on their progress. Its also a great retreat in the event of a sudden hailstorm as I discovered the other day!

#### Leadership

All leaders and committees have to be able to think their way through problems and design solutions. Often that is the easiest part of the process.

Selling those ideas, getting people to come along with you can be the hardest part.

A good leader/committee is in touch with their community and can clearly explain and argue the case for resolving the current problem.

Across the years we have seen this process successfully adopted in Australia;

In the 1980s the government was able to argue the case for the banning of cigarette and alcohol advertising and sponsorship of sport and other events.

In the 1990s the legislating of Land Rights for our indigenous peoples and the banning of smoking in public spaces.

#### WE HAVE ALSO SEEN FAILURES;

- The Republic Referendum of 2000
- The Indigenous Voice to Parliament Referendum in 2024.

A recent report in the Guardian highlighted the problems caused by wide-spread increases in gambling;

"Calls grow for total ban on gambling ads as Australia's annual losses surge to \$32bn". ...... "These losses consisted of \$23bn from gaming, mostly from poker machines (\$15.8bn); casinos (\$3.6bn) and lotteries (\$3.1bn); and a further \$9bn from wagering, betting on sports and racing". (Queensland Government Statistician's Office)

Today there is much discussion on the negative effects of gambling and how the constant stream of gambling ads are having a negative effect on the population in general but more specifically on our young people and children. A joint party committee on gambling produced a report late in 2023. There were 31 recommendations from that committee, one of which was a total ban on gambling advertising.

"The Albanese government has instead proposed a partial ad ban. That would entail ads banned online, in children's programming, during live sports broadcasts and an hour either side, and limits in general programming."

No-one is arguing for a ban on gambling, many people enjoy a day at the races or some unusual doubles/triples such as the winners at Wimbledon and AFL premiers and these and similar betting options will always attract people. However, the continual flow of betting advertising and gambling related sports commentary has become so pervasive that many of our young see sport only in terms of the betting odds.

The spread of gambling ads needs to be controlled because Australia's number one position in world gambling losses is nothing to be proud of.



#### **DR LINDSAY FRANCIS** (1925-2024)

Dr Lindsay Francis, a much-loved doctor in Romsey of the 1950's to 1990's, died recently (*May'24*). He practised for 43 years in Romsey and Lancefield, and further afield when needed. He retired to Cowes in 1995.

Lindsay Francis lived had lived in country Victoria and fell in love with Romsey. He practised from his home at 72-74 Main Road. This interesting house, it seems was 'unofficial' doctor's residence. Probably built in the 1880s, Dr Perrin Norris was its first owner; succeeded by Dr Hogan and then Dr Murdoch until 1950. Originally known at 'Maroo', Dr Murdoch practised here until his death. When Dr Francis and his wife Josie moved in they changed the name to 'Girrahween'.

Dr Francis was on call 24 hours a day,7 days of week. Returning after house visits, a queue of people was waiting patiently. Romsey knew that if needed you could knock on his front door at any time. There were no appointments. You came, sat and waited and talked to each other.

His practice was not limited to people; with no vet in Romsey, he treated animals as well. One story was of a goat treated on the surgery couch!

Dr Francis was on the committee to refurbish and open the Lancefield & District Bush Nursing Hospital, from 1955 to its closure in 1992. Kilmore lost its doctor in the 1960's and Dr Francis practised there twice weekly for a year – despite his popularity, he declined residents' request to move there.

Dr Francis was known to pick up patients to take them to hospital; some babies were born on the back seat of his car. As the story goes 'Delivery was high on his list of priorities, including of course babies, but varying to include groceries, meat and bread for those patients being visited, who had no transport.'


He served on the Establishment Committee for Cobaw Community Health Centre; was Secretary of the Romsey Progress Association for 20 years, and a member at Romsey Mechanics' Institute for ten years. He became a Life Member of the Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society.

Lindsay Francis had diverse talents. He played the organ at Romsey Anglican Church and was on the Vestry.

Dr Francis was a foundation member of the Lancefield and Romsey Bowling Club; he enjoyed bowls but pressure of work kept him away from the green, much to the distress of other players.

He supported the Romsey Red Cross and was President for a time. Dr Francis was 'Romsey Shire's Citizen of the Year' in 1995, and opened the redeveloped Romsey Medical Centre.

A farewell reception in June 1995 honoured Lindsay and his wife Josie for their long devotion to community.

#### Spring is here and hopefully warmer than our Winter

Hope everyone's gardens are looking very colourful with spring flowers and blooms. I feel for anyone who suffers from hayfever like myself to make it thru without too much trouble.

This is also when we do our spring cleaning after the house has been locked up for the winter

#### HERE ARE A FEW LOW-COST CLEANING PRODUCTS TO USE;

- All Purpose Cleaner
- One-part white vinegar
- One part water

- Lemon Rind
- Rosemary Sprigs

Combine the above ingredients together, pour into spray bottle then let infuse for a week before using. After a week use the cleaner to clean rubbish bins, wipe away smudges and much more. Besides a fresh scent the lemon rind may help boost cleaning power.

Baking soda and vinegar can tackle stubborn stains on the stovetop.

Clean your windows using vinegar.

Mix 2 tablespoons of vinegar in 4 litres of water. Put in a spray bottle and use on the window then wipe with a microfibre cloth.

We once had a dog. His name was 'WOOF'. Skinny, my mother's boyfriend, blamed cabbage for every smell which floated around the dining room, but my mother knew it was Woof who was responsible, and so my mum encouraged Woof to seek another domicile.

PS. Woof was so named because that was the sound which one uttered as Woof relaxed under the dining room table. CABBAGE: What the Chinese use to pad out the food they serve to Australians.

I don't know where cabbages came from, but I do know I came from under one because my dear old mum told me often enough.

Some authorities insist cabbages came from the Middle East. If they did, why were they not mentioned in the Bible? The Greeks ate it as a gut filler. Diogenes was said to have told a young courtier "If you lived on cabbage you would not be obliged to flatter the powerful." "If you flattered the powerful," replied the young bloke, "you would not be obliged to live on cabbage."

The wealthy Romans chomped into it with gay abandon, even though it was expensive. Claudius, the drunken glutton, once demanded the Senate debate if there was a better dish than corned beef and cabbage. They dutifully voted that there was not. Claudius was right in one thing, cabbages are the most versatile of vegetables .... And there are lots of varieties - broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, collard, kale and kohlrabi. it's interesting and important to know that any vegetable which has leaves which cross over each other - cruciferous - are considered to be excellent in combating stomach cancer, help heal gastric ulcers and stimulate the immune system. They contain calcium, magnesium, potassium, beta-carotene, folic acid, vitamins C, E, K, Thiamin and iodine.

#### **FRIED CABBAGE:**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1/2 head of cabbage (about 500 q)
- 1/2 green capsicum
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon mustard seeds
- 1/4 teaspoon each cayenne, turmeric powder, ground cumin and ground coriander
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice.

#### **METHOD**

- Remove the worn-out looking outer leaves of the cabbage and the thick centre stem. Cut the rest into fine shreds as if preparing the cabbage for coleslaw. Chop the capsicum into fine pieces.
- In a large heavy frying pan over a moderate heat, melt the butter then add the garlic, chopped capsicum and the mustard seeds. When the mustard seeds start to pop, add the cabbage and stir. Continue stirring while adding the rest of the spices. Stir until all the spices are well blended into the cabbage. Cook for 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent the cabbage from sticking to the bottom of the pan.
- When fully cooked, the cabbage will be only half its original size. When cooked, remove from the heat and squeeze the lemon juice over it then serve hot.

Lots of people sneer at cabbage, saying amongst other things it smells out the kitchen whilst it's cooking for days after. I'm not amongst them.

#### **LGBTI SENIORS FILM SCREENING**

As part of this month's Victorian Seniors Festival, Goldfields Libraries and Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health are hosting a free screening of the documentary 'LGBTI Seniors Untold Histories'.



The film explores the lived experiences of older LGBTI people living in Central Victoria and the changing attitudes in society towards sexual orientation and gender identity. The screening will be followed by afternoon tea and a panel discussion with the Director Noel Hourigan and two of the people featured in the film.

The event is one of the first activities organised by Sunbury and Cobaw's new Healthy LGBTI Ageing project which aims to increase understanding and support for the mental health and wellbeing of older LGBTI people in the area. The project, which has been made possible thanks to funding from the Victorian Department of Health Diverse Communities Grants Program, recognises the impact of marginalisation and discrimination on older LGBTI people's health, social connection, feelings of safety and belonging, and willingness to engage with services, especially in rural and regional areas.

"We invite older LGBTI people, their friends, allies and carers as well as staff working in organisations that provide services to older LGBTI people," says Tonye Segbedzi, Healthy LGBTI Ageing Advisor.

The Victorian Seniors Festival is a major state-wide festival for and involving seniors. The festival runs from 1–31 October every year, with free and low-cost events right across Victoria.

#### **Romsey Mens Shed**

In the last edition we commented that Romsey Mens Shed is part of the now multi-national Mens Shed movement that originated in Australia in the 80's. An objective is improving older mens' mental and indirectly their physical health. Younger men are also welcome, but a bit limited due to work and family commitments. Participating in community activities is also a given and our members help out wherever practicable.

We regularly meet with other Mens Shed representatives from the Macedon Ranges Shire to discuss options for service improvement and with some local Romsey Town activists occasionally. Recently we also had a visit from our local Federal Member for McEwen, Rob Mitchell.

#### Open times

We are in Romsey Park at 47 Barry Street and our usual operating times are:

- On Tuesdays from 9-4 for coffee, chats and for "hands-on" their project work;
- Wednesdays around 930am. for the woodwork enthusiasts,
- and Thursday is our most popular day, from around 930am to around 2pm. We have a five-dollar donation barbecue/light lunch at 12 noon and members guests are welcome. The menu varies and is often supplemented with donated Joshs Eggs. Potential members often come along to a lunch before joining. A brief report on committee activity is usually given by the Committee President and occasionally we have a guest speaker. We also have a five dollar donation "old pub style" meat raffle, to subsidise occasional lunch outings to museums or other places of interest.

# Romsey Gets a Mention in Parliament

Our Federal Member Rob Mitchell visited a number of Mens' Sheds in our district recently as part of Mens' Shed Week. The theme was "...send him down to the shed..." Rob gave a Parliamentary report on several Sheds, including Romsey. In his address to Parliament he made a number of observations including the impact of retirement on many men and sometimes the loss of a life time partner, that gave many men a feeling of isolation and stressed the important role the Mens' Shed movement provided to reconnect men into the community. The Hansard extract is:-

"....The Romsey Men's Shed have been working on the restoration of a 1925 Model T Ford gifted to the shed by local businessman Doug Newnham. This vehicle was sold new in Gisborne, originally. With the generous help of the Bendigo Community Bank, Romsey members are diligently working on its refurbishment, with the vehicle to be used for community events. This project has shown the depth of skills and knowledge at the local shed, from trade skills, such as mechanics, joinery and bodywork, right through to historical research...."

#### Our Continuing Series on Significant Buildings in Romsey

#### 124 Main Street, Romsey. A private residence

The building at 124 Main Street holds a rich history, beginning with the purchase of the land by Dr. George Birney in 1871. Dr. Birney and his brother Robert were notable figures in the area. Robert worked as a carpenter at Emu Bottom in Sunbury, by 1856 he had saved enough money to buy the 196-acre property 'Glenfern Park. Robert was elected a foundation member of the Lancefield Roads Board, and was one of the three local Justices of the Peace, and was a prominent Councillor of the Romsey Shire. George was one of the local Doctors in

Romsey and ran a small surgery at 'Glenfern Park.'

George commissioned the construction of the first building on the site more than ten years after acquiring the land, employing Alfred Pugh for the project. The building served many purposes, including housing the Lancefield Chronicle office, a chemist, a draper, and a boot shop. By the late 19th century, the property had passed into the hands of James Hemphill.

Tragedy struck July 6th 1904 when the fire that was to consume both the Romsey Mechanics Institute and Mr. Heffernan's boot shop and dwelling next door. It was started by a misplaced candle on a mantlepiece near to some curtains. The boot shop and dwelling were owned by Mr. James Hemphill which Mr. Heffernan was leasing. While Mr. Heffernan lost everything, Mr. Hemphill was insured and was able to rebuild. The building we see today is the rebuilt home and shop frontage along with the rebuilt structure of the Mechanics Institute.

Mr. Heffernan's house was only a few feet away from the Mechanics Institute and for a short time it looked as if the fire would remain contained to the little wooden structure until a tongue of flame leapt across to the wooden wall of the Mechanics Institute and didn't return. In a moment the whole building was enveloped in flames. The towns people did all they could to salvage what they could from the hall.

#### All the Life We Cannot See

Our waterways are too often polluted - microplastics, herbicides, nitrates from fertilizer, manure and sewerage. None of this we can see. AND aquatic microfauna, mostly "good guys" in rivers, lakes and wetlands. New species of microfauna are being discovered. We have much to learn of them and where they fit into ecosystems.

Dr Robert Walsh will talk about microfauna at Lancefield Show on Sunday, October 20 - a freshwater scientist, limnologist and aquatic invertebrate zoologist for 17 years in his lab (Rotifers, Copepods, Ostracods, Cladocera) to the level of a genus or species. Aquatic invertebrates (no backbone) are divided into either less than 2mm (aquatic microfauna) and animals larger than 2mm (aquatic macroinvertebrate fauna).

Microfauna link all in the aquatic food webs together, and the system will collapse without them. These tiny animals (*Rotifers, Copepods, Ostracods, Cladocera*) feed on detritus, bacteria, algae, diatomsprotozoa, and ciliates. Predators amongst them will consume other microfauna, larval macroinvertebrates and fish fry. These then provide a food source for aquatic macroinvertebrates, small young fish taxa, and birds. To put this simply: No microfauna = No Fish (*trout, perch, galaxids, cod, etc*) or Birds.



Managers of wetlands, waterways, reservoirs, water and sewerage treatment plants need to know the environment baseline and ecology of these two aquatic systems and animals.

Aquatic microfauna life cycle is days (*Rotifera*) or weeks (*Cladocera*, *Copeoda*, *Ostracoda*). With temporary inland waterways, these tiny animals drive the ecology of inland waters, rather than aquatic macro-invertebrates with longer life cycles.

Microinvertebrates tell us much on the health of aquatic environments. Some react to pollutants and environmental stress. Their presence (or absence) tells us if the environment is healthy or not. They are an early change indicator, responding quickly to changes in the environment. The canary in the coal mine! To find out more, come and see us at the Show.

## Soft plastic recycling pilot

Did you know you can now collect your soft plastic in a special orange collection bag and pop it in your recycling bin?

Council's shire-wide soft plastic recycling pilot program allows residents to recycle their soft plastic conveniently in their kerbside recycling bin. All soft plastic items that carry the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) – Return to Store symbol or REDcycle logo are accepted.

If you'd like to participate, visit your nearest Council customer service centre; Council's resource recovery facilities in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend; Kyneton Toyota Sports & Aquatic Centre or Gisborne Aquatic Centre to collect an information pack, which includes a letter and 20 orange collection bags.

If you have large amounts of soft plastics such as animal feed bags, plastic wrap from electrical goods or you are not on Council's kerbside service, you can take your soft plastic to a Council resource recovery facility for recycling.

The soft plastic collected in the pilot program will be sent to specialist processors in Victoria to make new plastic products locally, which supports our objectives to reduce waste to landfill, lower greenhouse gas emissions and litter.



#### Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub in Kyneton to open in October

Work to open Kyneton Health's Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub to the community is progressing with an expected launch in October 2024.

From October, the Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub in Kyneton will provide access to free Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) clinical services and information in a locally established, supportive and confidential environment.

It will be staffed by experienced SRH Nurses, partnering with GPs, Nurse Practitioners, Advanced Practice Nurses and Specialist services.

#### THE SERVICES WILL INCLUDE:

- Sexual health education: Screening, and management of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and bloodborne viruses, as well as cervical screening tests with options for self-collection or clinician collection.
- Contraception services: Providing information and counselling on all methods, alongside prescription services, injection delivery, implant insertion and removal, IUD insertion and removal, post-insertion checkups, and emergency contraception.

 Reproductive health care: Pregnancy testing, pregnancy options counselling, and supported access and referral to services covering both medical and surgical termination of pregnancy, as well as follow-up care.

Our service is for people from any geographical location within Victoria requiring sexual & reproductive health services including:

- Women, girls, and non-binary people of reproductive age
- Young people of any gender under the age of 25

In late June, Kyneton Health was selected as one of the final six Women's Sexual and Reproductive Health Hubs in Victoria joining the current network of 14 hubs that are already delivering free or low-cost care.






